HONORS FOREIGN LEGION.

France Unveils Tablet to 40,000 Volunteers.

PARIS, Aug. 24.—Foreign volunteers who swore allegiance to France at the outbreak of the war in 1914 were honored today at a ceremony held in the Invalides, the same spot where the men joined the Foreign Legion. A tablet was unveiled recording "that on August 21, 1914, free men of all nations of the world enrolled here for France and right."

Forty thousand men were recruited for the Foreign Legion during the war, 10,000 of whom were killed.

FINGER-PRINTS BY PHONE. The machine for transmitting photographic records over a telephone wire is to be mobilized in the interests of justice.

The chief of the Italian school for scientific criminology proposes to use this instrument for the transmission of finger-prints of suspected criminals.

By this means, when a man is arrested in London, for instance, it will be possible simultaneously to despatch his finger-prints to Paris, Berlin and Rome, and ask the police of those cities for any details they have regarding previous convictions.

King Edward And New York Editor

Some Unpublished History Becomes Known

This strong personal tie with America was never interrupted. Nay, it grew stronger as the years went on, and whether as Prince or King, King Edward lost no opportunity of acclaiming the identity of the two nations' interest. At the close of 1895, when President Cleveland threatened a breach of the Anglo-American understanding, Mr. Pulitzer, the proprietor of The New York World, who had met the Prince at Hamburg, took the unconventional course of telegraphing King George for an expression of his views of the perilous crisis. The King drafted the following reply: "I thank you for telegram. I earnestly trust and cannot but believe, present crisis will be arranged in a manner satisfactory to both countries and will be succeeded by such warm feelings of friendship which has existed between them for so many years. The Prime Minister, Lord Salisbury, deprecated the Prince's interference, and advised that Mr. Pulitzer's journalistic enterprise should in this instance be followed. No reply from the Prince at New York, and the incident and the prince's action are now revealed for the first time.

Eloping Couples Were At Woodstock

Maine Parents Searching for Young Girls

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 25.—Two eloping couples were here from Aug. 2nd to 10th, and made their homes with Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Ives, of Lower Woodstock.

During the month of July, J. Fred Noyes, aged 45 years, was arrested for kidnaping Alda B. Bennoch, the 15-year-old daughter of Charles P. Bennoch, of Greene Lake, Me. The girl was returned to her parents and Noyes was given bail before the Ellsworth Municipal Court, and set up for trial at the October term of the Supreme Court. He was let out on bail for \$1,000, the bail being furnished by a brother of Noyes and Hiram Patten. One of the witnesses, Ralph Hamilton, aged 23, on the morning of Aug. 2, a six-cylinder Reo, No. 29,322, containing Hamilton and Messrs. Alda and Orville Bennoch, aged 16, stopped at the residence of Mr. Ives and engaged rooms. They were joined by Noyes, who arrived on the 10th, while here new clothes were purchased for the girls and on Aug. 10th, they left for Paris, unknown, after Hamilton paid the rooms.

Some garments were missing from the rooms, and from information had received Mr. Ives wrote to the mother of the girls, replying having been received on Aug. 18th, stating that every effort was being made to find the eloping couple.

FACTS ABOUT THE BRAIN

With all the boasted cleverness, man knows little of the organ which is the source of his intelligence. In fact, until recent years he was almost as ignorant of its secrets and mysteries as Aristotle, who, more than two thousand years ago, declared that its only function was to cool the blood.

We know now that the brain is divided into a number of distinct compartments, each of which is the seat of a separate sense or function.

Thus, one compartment just behind the eyes and separated from them by a thin partition of bone, is responsible for speech. It is divided into three sections, one of which registers words that come through the ears; another records words seen through the eyes; and the third sets in motion the muscles of lips, tongue, and larynx which enable us to speak.

If the brain-tissue of the whole compartment is destroyed, not only is the power of speech lost, but also is the power to read and to understand spoken words.

On the other hand, if the injury is only partial—if, for example, only the section responsible for speech is destroyed, a man may be able to read and to understand what is said as well as to understand what he is to say, and to speak without being able to read.

In this speech-chamber, words heard are arranged in sections, like books on a library shelf. One section may be destroyed while the rest remain intact. Thus there are cases on record where a man has discovered suddenly that he can no longer read French, though he can still read and understand English, and vice versa.

The "shell" on which this language was stored has been destroyed. He can no longer understand a word of French, though his knowledge of other languages he has mastered remains unimpaired.

Another interesting discovery is that the size of the brain is no index to its mental capacity. The heaviest on record have been those of persons of low intelligence, while many of the world's cleverest men have had brains well below the average in weight.

But even more strange is the discovery that, though each of us has two brains—that is, two perfectly matched hemispheres of brain—only one of them is used; the other remains inactive throughout life. In fact, if it were lost, we should not miss it at all.

When we are born, both sections are available for use; but, as a matter of fact, we educate only one of them. Which of the two this is to be decided when, in infancy, we begin to train by the hand we use most easily. Thus, with the right-handed, the educated half of the brain is that in the left side of the head; with the left-handed it is the right hemisphere. And all future education is confined to the half thus chosen automatically.

It is a common impression that it is the eyes that see. As a matter of fact, the eyes can no more see than the opera-glass through which they look. They are merely a medium for conveying the image formed on the retina to two convolutions—collections of grey matter—behind, with which the seeing is actually done. Thus, if these convolutions are destroyed, total blindness results, though the eyes may be as good as ever.

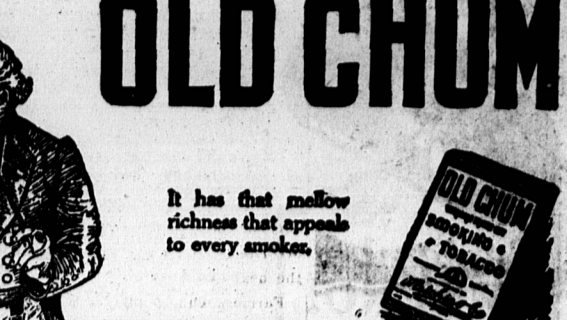
