Active Year For The C. W. L.

The following report of Catholic Women's League activities throughout the province during the past year was presented at the diocesan convention of the organization here this week by the executive secretary Mrs. J. Austin Murphy, of Brudenell.

"It is pleasing to report that practically all our sub-divisions sent reports of the work accomplished during the year. We have 22 sub-divisions, with an approximate membership of 1522. The total amount of money raised was \$11,204.46. With the exception of National and Diocesan obligations and amounts contributed towards war work, this money was spent by the different sub-divisions in parish work. Realizing that after the home, their first duty is their parish, our women are co-operating with their pastors in helping to defray church debt, re-decorating churches and parish halls, and in some parishes have financed the building of convent schools.

**Religious**

174 masses were offered for the men making the supreme sacrifice and for those on active service, one sub-division has a Mass offered every week. Spiritual Bouquets consisting of many Masses heard, Communions offered, rosaries, Way of the Cross, ejaculations on behalf of our soldiers were sent to Bishop Neilligan, 472 Communion breakfasts were provided by the Charlottetown sub-division to men of the armed forces. This work was carried out under the direction of the Chairman, Reverend Louis A. Dougan, who is ever zealous for the spiritual welfare of the men under his care.

**Citizenship**

Members are realizing more the necessity of representation on all boards, and are ready and willing to assist in all phases of community endeavor. We have representation on the following: Red Cross Society, Tuberculosis League, Library Board, Institute for the Blind, Anti-Cancer Society, Provincial and Local Association Girl Guides, Women's Advisory Committee W.P.C. Children's Aid Society and Canadian Legion.

**War Work**

Great activity in all phases of War Work is evident, by the amount of work accomplished. 2,342 sewn and knitted garments were completed, 53 quilts were made and 1692 quilts labeled and packed. 840 hours were spent in Red Cross work rooms. Many of our members have registered as blood donors, while others assist in Red Cross

**PARISIANS Cheer Allied Soldiers**

PARIS, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Past the Arc De Triomphe and down through the avenues where their fathers had walked a generation ago, the men of a great American infantry regiment marched today.

This was Paris' first, real commemoration of the war. There were cheers and laughter, but it was a solemn moment when Lt. Gen. Bradley and Lt. Gen. Koenig laid a wreath on the tomb of France's unknown soldier of the First Great War.

Hundreds of thousands of persons stood along the line of march along the Champs Elysees, the place Vendome, at the Obelisk, Place De La Concorde, in the Rue De Rivoli and all through these beloved avenues.

At the Obelisk Gen. Bradley, Gen. De Gaulle, Gen. Montgomery, and Brig. Gen. James H. Doolittle reviewed the great parade.

First came armored cars, four abreast and then long files of foot soldiers, sloping along with the beat of the drums, just as other soldiers did here at an hour of crisis 26 years ago.

It has been a great day with rain and just enough breeze to faintly stir the French flags and the American flags which hang in massed thousands in Paris.

Along the line of march were mingled and mixed cries and shouts—everything from "God bless you" to "any such tank!"

Paris is not in such a riotous mood as Monday.

**In Battle Array**

For this was not a march by soldiers in full battle dress, this division marched in battle array. It marched through Paris toward another rendezvous with action—the city and back into the line of attack.

It was a strange panorama. Here a girl, with a curse, threw a picture of Hitler underneath an armored car, and there a bearded priest stood solemnly with uplifted hands, not bothering to brush away tears that moved down his cheeks.

The music itself was a medley of all that is familiar in the Allied world—the Marseillaise, God Save the King, the Star Spangled Banner, Dixie, and marching through units began marching just at 2 p.m. but half an hour before that at 2 o'clock at Portland United Church military ritual under the Arc De Triomphe by the French Republican Guard and the tomb of France's unknown soldier.

These soldiers wore brass hats with red cockades and lions biceps official hair ribbons. Their uniforms were black and their trousers white. With precise dignity they saluted their unknown comrade of another war as the notes of the last post rose under the Arc and the eternal light burning in the tomb sent up its barely visible wisps of smoke.
