QUARTER MILLION IRISHMEN IN ARMIES

MANCHESTER, England, March 15.—John Redmond, leader of the Irish nationalist party, in a speech to five thousand persons here today, pointed out that he had often addressed meetings of Irishmen in Manchester, but never before an assemblage of Irishmen and Englishmen "firmly united in a common purpose." "Ireland has been admitted to her proper place in the British empire, with which she had as much to do in building up as England," Mr. Redmond continued. "She has already taken her proper place with profit and absolute good faith and loyalty." Official figures covered the period up to February 15th, he said, showed that 99,700 Irishmen, from Ireland had joined the colors, 115,000 from other parts of the United Kingdom, and enough more from the Dominions to bring up the total to

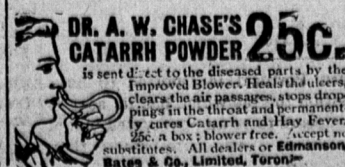

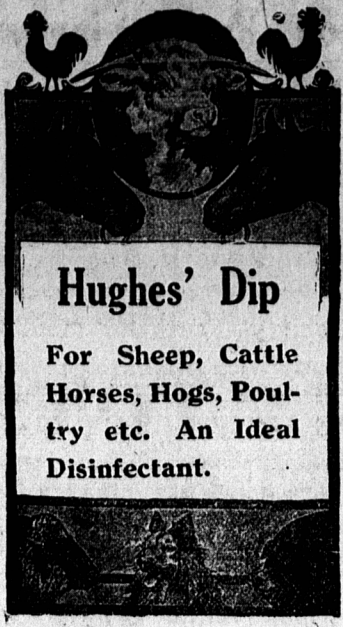

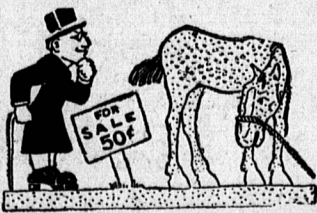
