Bootleggers 'Buy Liquor At Stores' And Then Resell It

There have been many reports lately that New Brunswick liquor control board stores, in Saint John as well as in other parts of the province, have been selling large quantities of liquor to known bootleggers.

The liquor in turn peddling it at "handsome profit." Practically all of the liquor sold by bootleggers is government liquor, compared to the hazy days when shiploads of illicit wet goods were "run in."

Anybody is allowed to buy a certain quantity of wet goods-one bottle of hard liquor and a dozen quarts or two dozen pints of beer-each day, except of course a known addict. Officially, no one is allowed to buy more than this on any one day, unless by direct permission of the Liquor Control Board, but it is generally recognized that this regulation is not strictly adhered to.

R. G. Fulton, chairman of the board, in answering a question on why known bootleggers were sold liquor at the stores said that while a known bootlegger or his known agent goes to the store to buy liquor, if the clerks carry out the letter of the regulations to the full, the bootleggers often get people who are complete strangers to the clerks to go to the stores for them.

The more agents they send to the stores-the agent to be paid in money or liquor-the more the bootleggers can lay their hands on.

Trying to Hit Right One Mr. Fulton said the board is working on some method by which he hopes to control this. Systems followed in other provinces, such as the permit system, are being looked into also, but the permit system, for instance, has been found not to be 100 per cent perfect. Some system which would work no hardship on the law-abiding citizen, but which would "legitimate buyer" must be found.

Reports that some liquor store clerks "take a chance" and sell liquor to known bootleggers or their known agents, for "certain returns," are investigated promptly. Mr. Fulton said if such a practice is suspected an immediate investigation is made, with disciplinary action taken if the employee is found to be guilty.

Heavy Buying Season Whether the shorter hours in New Brunswick have achieved what presumably was the aim of the liquor board-a curtailment in the amount of liquor consumed-is difficult to ascertain at this date, only 15 days after the new hours were put into effect. Another factor governing the situation is the season, it being the custom of those who buy liquor whether in small or large quantities, to "put in a little extra stock for Christmas and New Year's."

The sale on New Year's Eve usually is, on the whole, extremely heavy.

Mr. Fulton, in his Dec. 2 announcement on shorter hours, said the board had decided to cut the hours of sale in view of the "wishes of a large number of the people," many organizations having demanded that sale of liquor be cut out entirely for the duration of the war.

Asked whether he thought the shorter hours for the stores would result in longer hours-and consequently-much more business-for the bootleggers, Mr. Fulton thought not. In the last few weeks police in Saint John have brought a series of cases of illegal sale, or illegal possession of liquor before the courts.

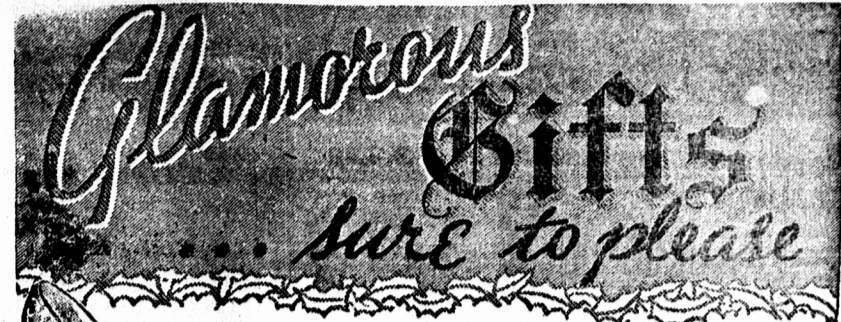
