LECTURES AT HAVE ATTAINED SCHOOL OF HIGH DEGREE THEOLOGY OF EFFICIENCY

Two lectures were delivered yesterday afternoon in the school of theology conducted at Hearts Memorial Hall, one "The Vision of Isaiah" by Professor W. G. Watson, D. D., the other "The Fact of Christ" by Professor J. S. Thomson, M.A. The evening lecture which was especially for young people, was on "The Challenge of Life" by Professor J. S. Thomson. Dr. W. G. Watson gave the first address in the afternoon session on "The Vision of Isaiah." The account of his vision and call are recorded in Isa. 6. The vision is a profound spiritual experience. In it there is a note of mystery and an element of ecstasy. The real test of such experience is found in their value to the man who receives them and in its effect upon the world. Dr. Watson indicated the condition of the world within in Judaism in the year that King Uzziah died. Judah, surrounded by enemies, needed a deliverer to meet the danger of Assyria. This was the political condition when Isaiah experienced his vision and the call. He goes to the temple and there he saw the Lord, high and lifted up. The great truth of this vision is the awful majesty of God, the holiness of the Lord. The word "holiness" in our minds connotes moral purity, but in the Old Testament the word expresses the general idea of the Godhead. This account of Isaiah's experience in chapter six contains among other things the elements essential to a diet of public worship, the sacred place, the sense of awe and reverence, the consciousness of sin, the confession of sin, forgiveness of sin, the challenge of God "whom shall I send" and the response of the hearer "Here am I send me."

PARIS, May 20.—The continental edition of the London Mail in a despatch from Fontainebleau today represented former King Alfonso as greatly annoyed at reports from Madrid that he had used his royal office to augment his personal fortunes. He is said to contend that the bulk of his personal fortune was derived from economies made years ago by the late Queen Mother Maria Cristina. It was said to be not more than 30,000,000 pesetas (present exchange value \$3,000,000) which, when Alfonso left Spain, was invested principally in Spanish utilities. These probably since have depreciated in value because of threats of confiscation. Far from being able to put money aside Alfonso for several years past was said to have paid out large sums from his own pocket for charities and entertainments in the interest of the state.
