He thought there was no reason why they should not have a membership of over one hundred and spoke about the value of co-operation in different lines of agriculture. The secretary had received a letter from Percy Marchbank, Secretary of the Provincial Institute, about the sending of delegates to Ottawa to meet the Western delegation of farmers who are to lay their views on the tariff question before the Government. It was unanimously decided that it would be well to send such a delegation and the Institute pledged themselves to bear its just and fair proportion of the expenses of such delegates if they should be sent. The meeting was a most enthusiastic one and a vote of thanks was tendered Prof. Ross, coupled with the suggestion that as he is Superintendent of the Farmers' Institutes, he should make it a point to visit them more frequently.
