VEGETARIAN BRAWN

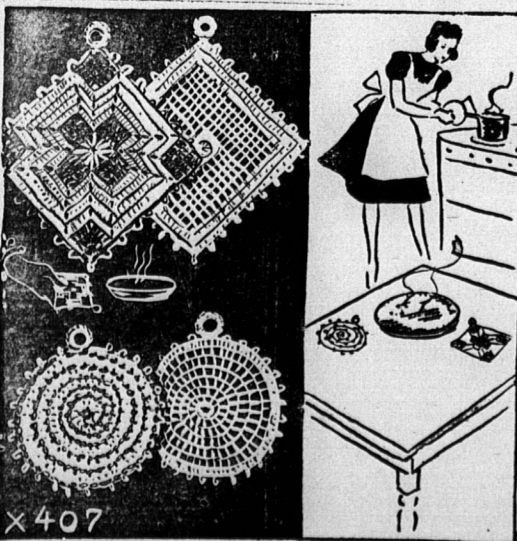
Half lb tomatoes; 1-2 oz margarine. Scald and peel the tomatoes then cut up and place in a pan with the margarine, simmer gently for a few minutes. Now add two ounces of grated cheese with four ozs. of bread-

crumbs, one egg well beaten, as well as a little grated spring onion. Season well with salt and pepper. Simmer gently until the mixture thickens. Pour into small glass moulds and pour a little melted butter on top. This is ideal for hot weather sandwiches, and incidentally is not too hard on the ration!

KIDNEY CHARLOTTE

One ox kidney; 1 small onion; 1 oz margarine; 6 ozs crumbs; seasonings and sauce for flavouring. Grate the onion, mix with the crumbs. Divide the margarine into small pieces slice the kidney

When you buy lima beans, avoid yellowish, rounded pods as these signify maturity, and the beans will be strachy and tough.

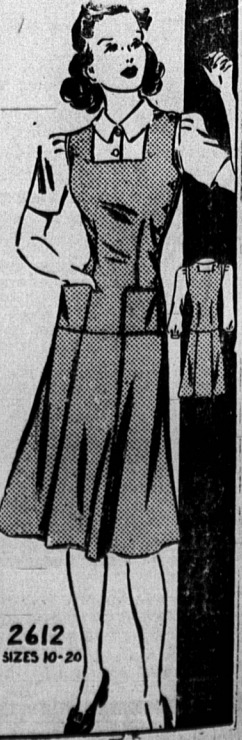
