Continued from page 1. ment that debentures be issued for the sum total of the indebtedness of the Province. The amendment was lost on a party vote. The House was then moved into Committee to consider the act to amend the Oyster Fisheries act. The Premier explained that as there had been considerable discussion on this bill he had concluded to accept the amendment of Mr. Morson which is as follows:—"That after the word 'affect' in the last line the words the rights of Canada be inserted, so that it will then read as follows:—"Provided, however, that nothing in this Act is intended to affect the rights of Canada in any public harbor." The amendment was then put and carried and the act reported agreed to with amendment. The act to amend the act to provide for the consolidation of the debt of the Province was read a third time. The act prohibiting the use of automobiles was read a third time. Hon. Mr. Gallant then resumed his speech on the Budget debate. A point of order was raised when Hon. Mr. Cummissey rose to speak on the main motion. Mr. Mathieson objected, saying that the Commissioner had already spoken to the main motion. Hon. Mr. Cummissey resumed his seat. Mr. McDonald rose to submit an amendment—but this was ruled out by the Speaker. Mr. McDonald then went on to speak on the main motion. He went into the matter of the public roads and said the roads were only good during the dry season—at other times they were spoiled. He asked if the Commissioner was aware that a simple implement was in use—the split log—in Ontario it had been tried with success. House adjourned at 6 p. m. to meet tomorrow at 10 a. m.

SEWING BY HANDS 210 FEET IN AIR

Joseph Bailey, Jersey City Steeplejack, Has Narrow Escape In The Big Wind—A Startling Trick

NEW YORK, April 8—On a chimney, 210 feet high, a steeplejack gave an exhibition of pluck and agility to Jersey City yesterday that brought plaudits from several hundred persons. The steeplejack is Joseph Bailey, thirty years old, of No. 528 Grove street, Jersey City. He is employed by the Heines Building Construction Company, of Phoenixville, Pa., which has put up an iron chimney for a tea company at Provost Bay streets. Bailey was engaged in putting a "collar" on the chimney not many feet from the top. He was seated in a "chair," which consisted of a narrow piece of wood which was supported by ropes that ran from the ends of the "chair" to tangle at the top of the chimney. The man had his feet pressed against the side of the chimney when a heavy west wind caused the narrow seat to sway, and as his feet slipped he slid from the chair. As he did so he caught hold of a rope that hung suspended in the air as the "chair" was blown around to the other side of the chimney by the wind. Scores of persons who had been watching him at work shouted in horror when they saw his nanger; and their cries brought hundreds of workers to the windows of the big factories near by and to the streets. Bailey swung for what seemed a long time to the watchers and then began to pull himself up hand over hand to the top of the chimney. The wind was blowing so hard that it caused him to sway, and now and again he would knock against the iron side of the chimney. He persisted bravely, however, and when he finally reached the top and seated himself on the narrow edge a cheer went up from the watchers in the street and factories. He descended on the inside of the chimney by means of apparatus that had been provided for that purpose.

BRITISH PREMIER GETTING BETTER

Prospects for Recovery Brighter Than They Were a Week Ago

LONDON, April 8—The prospects for the recovery of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman seem brighter now than a week ago. Convalescence, however, under the best circumstances, will be very slow. The Prime Minister has now intimated to his colleagues his desire to be relieved of office and a public announcement of his resignation may be expected any day. It is understood that communications on the subject are now passing between London and Biarritz, where King Edward is staying.

MAN STUCK IN A PORTHOLE

Strange And Awkward Predicament Into Which A Stowaway Got Himself

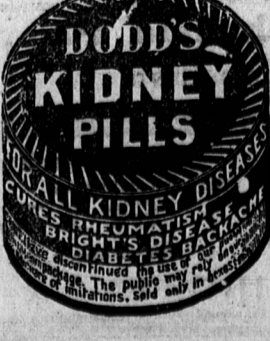
NEW YORK, April 6—Guiseppe Capello, a young stowaway, got stuck fast in a porthole today, while trying to escape from the Italian steamer Brasile, which just arrived here, and it required the combined efforts of the police, the ship's officers and crew to extricate him. For two hours the young man lay struggling half in and half out of the opening, while a force of men worked him this way and that cut his clothing, bruised his skin but still could not budge his body an inch. It was not until a portion of the porthole had been cut away that the lad was liberated. Then he was freed, only to be taken to the emigrant station at Ellis Island, from where he will probably be deported.

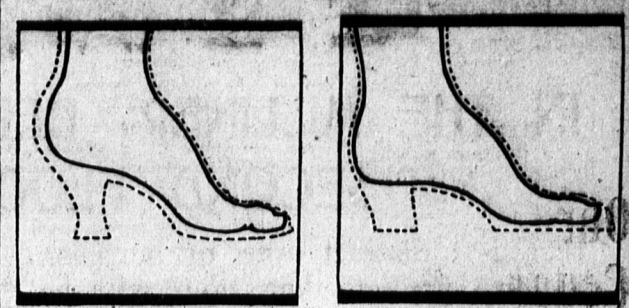
