Some have raced before on English tracks, but the majority are maidens, so to speak, which will render the barrier for the first time when they appear on the Canadian tracks. They will be wintered at the Prince's farm in Alberta.

Easter Cattle

No. 8. Shorthorn steer two years and seven months old, weight 1310 pounds.

These three were finished by Frank Sanderson, the veteran breeder and feeder of North River. Mr. Sanderson is an old hand at the game and knows how to put the weight and finish on Easter Cattle. The heavy steer, 1700 pounds, the heaviest on the market, this season was bred and fed on the farm of Mr. Sanderson. The two young steers wonderful for their age, were bred by Waldo Bain, York Point.

Notwithstanding the high cost of feed Messrs Saunders, Newsom & Co., have kept up to the highest standard made in former years.

GUELPH, Ont., March 22.—A street car smashed into the hearse which was conveying the body of Mrs. Wesley Simpson to the Church of Our Lady this morning. Fisheries Protection

The following letter is being sent from the office of the Inspector of Fisheries to canners and buyers throughout this province:—Office of the Inspector of Fisheries Charlottetown, P. E. I., March 19, 1920.

Sir:—Knowing that you have the interests of the Fisheries at heart I take this method of enlisting your help and co-operation in the preservation of fish, especially in their spawning season. Every branch of the Fisheries is an asset to the province and should be protected by every well meaning citizen. The Fishery Officers will do all that is possible to have the restrictions respected, but if we judge the future by the past there will always be violations of the Fishery Regulations, but this can be minimized if all violations were reported to the Fishery Officers promptly. Any information given this office will be strictly confidential. We are endeavoring to establish a standard in the different sizes of lobster cans, and I am sure every packer will realize that better prices will always be obtained for an article that can be guaranteed on its net weight, but to accomplish this, all illegal fishing and buying of lobsters packed illegally must be cut out.

It is my intention to have special officers to prevent illegal trafficking in lobsters in the close season, so I am asking every buyer to refrain from buying illegally packed goods. Do not wish to take any mean advantage, "but a word to the wise is sufficient."

I trust that you will co-operate with the officers to prevent illegal fishing, by informing them of any illegalities which may take place in your locality. Thanking you in advance for any favors along these lines.

British Miners' Strike Inevitable

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 25.—A strike of the miners is regarded as inevitable tonight, according to E. H. Thomas, General Secretary of the National Railwaymen. There is also the possibility of a general railway strike in Britain.

Syria Proclaims a Boycott

BEIRUH, March 22.—Emir Feisal, the newly elected King of Syria, has declared a boycott against countries occupying territory of Arabs, France and England, and has organized a commission for the purpose of bringing Moslems and Christians into a better understanding.

Posters displayed at Damascus, where the Syrian congress proclaimed independence of that country, declared: "In spite of himself, the Moslem is brother to the Christian and the Jew. The Arabs existed before Christ, Moses or Mohammed, and freedom and independence are rights of Syria. Religion is of God and the fatherland belongs to His children."

The Syrian congress signed a decree asking foreigners to evacuate that region, and Palestine land Mesopotamia are reported to have been specifically included.

French forces are reported to have been repulsed and compelled to retreat from Ourf. The entire Adana section is in a ferment and the roads are infested by hill-men co-operating with Turkish Nationalists, who make the portion of the thinly-scattered French forces perilous.

Railway Strike Settled

MADRID, March 25.—The railway strike has been settled. The government granted railways temporary loan so they could pay the increased wages demanded by employees.

Reforms Proposed for South Africa

CAPE TOWN, March 23.—At the opening of parliament the Governor General, Viscount Buxton, in outlining the Government programme said the time had come to introduce reform in the native administration. Those should include the establishment of an advisory commission and the electing of native councils in large native areas to assist the Government and keep it in touch with the administration of the country.
