province is expected, it was learned today. The referendum now shows a majority of about 6,000 in favor of union on the basis of incomplete returns but Canada's decision will likely be withheld pending receipt of a formal application for confederation from the Newfoundland Government. Meanwhile, R. A. Mackay of the External Affairs Department is en route to Newfoundland, presumably to confer with Sir Gordon MacDonald, Governor of the Colony, on the form to be adopted for confederation overtures to the Dominion. One report said a delegation from St. John's might come to Ottawa bearing the formal request of the Commission Government to be included in Canada's territory. Some Government officials suggested that if all went well, Newfoundland might become Canada's 10th province by Dominion Day, 1949.
