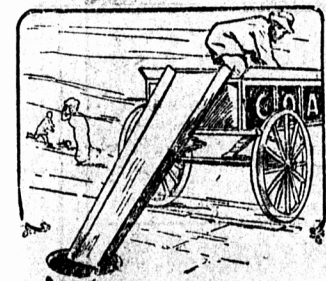

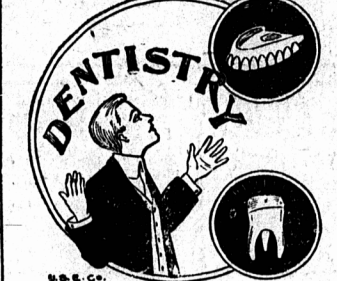

CHARLOTTETOWN AND ELSEWHERE

The C. G. S. Minto is expected at Halifax today from Hudson Bay.

Mrs. W. D. Rose, wife of Capt. Rose, U. S. N., of Milton, North West Arm, Halifax, after a pleasant visit of three weeks to her mother, Mrs. Hensley, Charlottetown, has returned home.

The funeral of the late Mrs. James Turner took place yesterday at 2.30 p. m. from the residence of her son-in-law, A. Duchemin, Charlottetown, to Sherwood cemetery and was largely attended.

An accident occurred on Saturday last which might have resulted in the death of Pearl, the nineteen months' old daughter of George and Mrs. Douglas of 166 Kent Street, Charlottetown. The child while playing up stairs, procured a bottle of carbolic acid from the room of a boarder and drank part of it, the little one not knowing what she was taking. Dr. Ralph was hastily summoned and owing to his rapid response to the call, the child was saved from what might have resulted in its death.—Pat.

A large meeting of the inhabitants of Rustico and vicinity was held on the twenty-first inst. in the old Bank Hall for the purpose of pressing their claims toward railway accommodation for that part of the country. The meeting was called to order by appointing Joseph Doucette as chairman. Mr. Doucette in coming forward explained the object of the meeting. Good speeches were made by the following speakers—Simon Pineau, John H. Buntain, William Moffatt, John C. Clark, Thomas Doyle and Stanislaus Buote. Rev. Father Chaisson being present, he was asked by the chairman to express his views on the matter. He spoke strongly in favor of railway accommodation for this part of the country. Among other things he went on to show that, although the car-ferry would be built, at the Capes, without railway accommodations this community would be still laboring under the same disadvantage. In closing he appealed to the people to keep this question before the government and see that it would be brought to a final issue. The following delegates were appointed to wait on Messrs. MacLean and Nicholson, the federal members, before taking their departure to Ottawa for the opening of the House—Simon Pineau, John H. Buntain, William Rodd, and Thomas Doyle. A vote of thanks was tendered to the chairman and the meeting came to a close.
