**FRUIT GROWERS  
AT OTTAWA**

OTTAWA, March 23.—There are delegates to the fruit convention, now being held here, from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island, those from the latter province being Rev. A. E. Burke, Alberton; A. G. Dewar, Charlottetown; J. C. Readey, department of agriculture.

There was about 100 delegates present. Hon. Sydney Fisher presided. Mr. Fisher said the gathering was an important one being composed of the leading fruit men of the country, and its recommendations would have corresponding weight with the government.

Good work was being done by the various provincial fruit associations, but the dominion association was necessary for the purpose of considering fruit questions of a national character.

The marketing of fruit presented a number of problems, though many people thought all were solved if cold storage were provided. That was only one of the problems. Others were the handling, the speed of trains and of steamships. Transportation was the great problem.

**OBITUARY.**

Passed away peacefully at Boston Mass., March 12th 1906 of puerperal septicaemia, in the 32nd year of her age, Sarah C. the dearly beloved wife of George M. Lively, and daughter of Hugh McLean, Esq., of Dundas P. E. Island.

During her short illness, she had the best medical skill that could be obtained and a noted specialist was in attendance, but skill and science were both alike baffled; and she succumbed to the inevitable.

As an expression of the feelings of her many friends, the floral tributes were so many that space is not available to mention them here.

The obsequies were conducted at Waterman's Chapel, Roxbury by the Rev. Mr. Olser. A large concourse of friends and relatives were in attendance, after which the cortege moved to North Station, whence the remains were accompanied by her late husband G. M. Lively and her brother Jas. A. McLean and crossed by the Minto to Georgetown—thence by rail to Cardigan. Quite a number met them at the station, whence the remains were conveyed to the old homestead at Dundas. The funeral ceremonies were conducted at the house by Rev. M. N. McLeod, and Rev. Mr. McPhee—There were upwards of eighty sleighs in the procession. The remains were laid to rest at the Presbyterian church. The sympathy of all is extended to the husband in his sore bereavement and not less so to the father who is so often called upon to mourn the loss of dear ones. This but a few years since his eldest son A. McLean died of enteritis near Bulwago, South Africa. He was doing a grocery business under the name of McLean & Allen. The Jamieson raid was an occasion for the Hulus and other hostile tribes to raid the British—the citizens of Bulwago were obliged to desert the town with what effects they could carry. Young McLean was in the British S. A. cavalry and undergoing hardships, finally yielded to the unequalled combat. His grave is on the open veldt, not far from Bulwago. He then parted in death with his beloved wife.—Two years ago the remains of his youngest son W. D.

McLean were brought from Nelson B. C. where he met an almost instantaneous death on the Columbia River. He was scaling timber, and it is supposed the jam broke Walking some distance from where he was hit—he was seen to stagger and fall—the company's steam launch was under steam and in a few minutes was under way when they noticed one of the fast C. P. R. boats on her way to Nelson. He was at once put aboard, and hemorrhage took place in a short time after. He breathed heavily, and passed away and now side by side with her youngest brother another of the family is laid to rest. Of the family, there are left to mourn Annie M., wife of Duncan Stewart of Boston; Christina, wife of Sewall Robertson Esq., Kingsborough, P. E. I.; Euphemia at home, John D. in Phoenix B. C. and John K. near Vancouver B. C. and Joseph A. in Boston.—Through the P. E. Island Guardian the bereaved has had desires to thank his many friends in Boston and vicinity for their kindness and sympathy, and also the people of Dundas, for their considerate kindness extended to him in his bereavement.
