The Charlottetown mail arrived in Summerside about 11 a. m. yesterday and the foreign mail about 6.45 p. m.

Travelling on the ice between here and Beleque is dreadfully bad on account of the ice being sunk with the weight of snow and most people avoid going by that route.

A Children's Carnival was held in Crystal rink last evening and was well attended by skaters in costume and spectators who enjoyed an hour's skating from 9 till 10 p. m. The Boys' Own Band discoursed good music.

The death occurred at Central, Lot 16, on Wednesday afternoon of John McLaren of that place after an illness of two years. He was unmarried and resided on the homestead with his mother and younger brother Arthur. Deceased was about 70 years of age and leaves to mourn, an aged mother, four brothers, James, William and Arthur at Lot 16 and Robert in Charlottetown, and two sisters, Mrs. Edmund Birch, Belmont and Mrs. Russell in Florida.

It is said there is open water off Souris as far as the eye can reach beyond two miles of board ice.

The foreign mail to reach the city today is the first to cross to the Island since a week ago yesterday.

AFTER the recent thaw the Hillsboro rink was opened again last evening. There was a large attendance and the ice was in excellent condition.

The diamond previously found was discovered near Pretoria, and weighed 3,032 carats. It was valued, locally, at \$3,500,000 to \$4,000,000, and is now on its way to England to be examined by experts. An insurance of \$500,000 was placed upon it. Since the finding of this diamond all the land in the immediate neighborhood of where it was discovered has been taken up by the prospectors. There was a suggestion made that an English lord's purchase be taken up in England for the purchase of the diamond and its representation to his Majesty King Edward, but nothing has come of it.

His Honor Judge Fitzgerald lectured before the students of St. Dunstan's College last evening on Abraham Lincoln. The learned lecturer sketched in a truly realistic manner the life and labors of one of America's greatest sons, a man whom no chance of place or birth elevated to the highest position which it is the privilege of a free-born American citizen to occupy. He said that Lincoln furnished to the world an example of what strenuous effort may accomplish. That was the type of man seldom met with and too seldom imitated, and that when the goal of his ambition had been reached and he was called upon to perform stern duties at the crisis of a nation's history he did not shrink from the task because he possessed nobility of soul and a firm belief in that Omnipotent Being who ever strengthens the arm of the righteous. At the close S. Mac'Donald in a neat speech moved a vote of thanks which was seconded by P. J. MacKenna and supported by John Quinn and Rev. Dr. McLellan. In reply the lecturer counselled the students to make good use of their golden opportunity taking Lincoln as their model.

The Artist and His Ideal. George Frederic Watts is described by his biographers as the simplest and most humble of men. His personal humility and self-effacement, says a writer in The Monthly Review, formed a striking contrast to the loftiness of his aims and the passionate strength of his convictions.

His daily actions were a living illustration of his belief in the German motto which the Queen of Roumania, "Carmen Sylva," suggested to him as the text of one of his most touching pictures: "What I spent, I had; what I saved, I lost; what I gave, I have."

"Our little life," he wrote once, "is poor indeed if bounded by our own personal wants and fancied requirements."

Among countless instances of his generosity is one which he often recalled because of its connection with his picture, "Love and Life," now hanging in the White House in Washington, a work which he considered his most important message to the world.

A poor artist's wife, who he had never seen before, came to his studio in sore distress, and, begged for a loan of a few pounds to enable her to join her husband who lay dangerously ill in New York. Watts gave her all, and more than all she asked, and she left him with tears of gratitude in her eyes, promising to come and see him on her return. Two years afterward she appeared, accompanied by her husband, who was restored to health and had found work in America, and repaid the money which Watts had lent her.

When the painter asked what had led her to apply to a total stranger like himself, she replied, "The sight of your picture, 'Love and Life.'" She felt that the man who had painted that picture must have a heart overflowing with love and pity for the suffering humanity, and the issue proved that she was right.

In his candor and quietness Watts never shrank from giving his sitters good advice. A thorough-going idealist himself, Watts expected his friends to live up to the level of their art, and was pained to see any inconsistencies in their conduct. "Come, King Arthur would not have talked in that way," he said to Tennyson one day, when the poet was in a more boisterous mood than usual. But when the laureate showed him his knotted and swollen fingers, he understood, and felt satisfied that it was "all the gout."

WERE LED BY A WOMAN.

BRIDGEPORT, Feb. 28.—Mrs. Frank Hook, 35 years old, in the Putnam county jail in Carmel, charged with being the leader of horse thieves who have been operating under a daring system in this state and Connecticut for the last three months, has confessed her guilt. Her husband, Frank Hook, alias Frank Odell, is a prisoner in the same jail, while John Sommers, their confederate, is in the Dutchess county jail in this city. The men also have confessed their guilt and expressed their intention of pleading guilty.

The authorities say that Mrs. Hook was not only the brains of the gang, but that on at least three occasions which they know she accompanied her husband on horse stealing expeditions. Sommers says she did all the planning and the business for the gang.

They had their headquarters near Bridgeport, where Hook and Sommers became acquainted three months ago. They hired a house with a barn, where they kept the horses until they could find purchasers for them. The authorities have traced ten stolen horses which they sold in that vicinity and recovered Sommers and Hook in the course of the last week. Sommers and his wife and two children lived in a part of the house, while Hook and his wife occupied the rest.

When Mrs. Hook accompanied her husband on an expedition she wore a large bonnet until they were well out in the country. Then she would remove the bonnet and put on a brown cloth cap, held fast with a long pin, a white cloak and a veil. They drove in a wagon or sleigh. Mrs. Hook would hold the horse while her husband went into the barn and led out the animal that looked the most valuable. That he is a good judge of horses is shown by the fact that always it was the best horse in the barn that was missing next morning. Mrs. Hook held the rope leading the booty behind the wagon as they jogged home. Hook always went armed, but, so far as known, he never used his revolver. The woman usually did most of the talking in negotiating the sale of a horse, and the neighbors regarded her as a "right smart business woman."

She never accompanied her husband when he took Sommers along. In November they stole two horses from this city, coming here by train and driving the horses to Bridgeport, where they were sold. Sommers says that Mrs. Hook has a married sister living in this city. The detection of the woman and her pals came through her stealing, with her husband a valuable cob in Brewsters. A horse owners' association put a detective on the trail, which he followed to Bridgeport. Then the storm broke on the heads of the horse thieves. Since her arrest Mrs. Hook has spent much of her time praying and reading the Bible.
