EXCELLENT.—The Guardian has much pleasure in publishing the following interesting fact. Messrs. Andrew McRae & Sons, of East Royal, received on Wednesday the certificate, from the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association, of the milk and butter fat given by their registered cow, "Milk Maid 7th." Under the test, a thorough and rigorous one which lasted exactly three hundred and sixty-five days, the cow gave 16,696 lbs. of milk and 720 of butter fat, which is about 500 lbs. of milk and 105 lbs. of butter fat more than the next highest producing Ayrshire in the world and short of only one, a United States animal which gave a larger quantity of milk under different conditions. It is essential, in order that a cow may equal in the Canadian record of performance, that the cow must have had a calf the year before she begins her test and another within fifteen months after she has begun it. This requirement does not obtain in the United States, so that the records of Messrs. McRae's cow and the one

GRAND DIVISION SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The second quarterly session of the Grand Division, S. of T. convened at Fredericton on Tuesday last was one of the most largely attended and encouraging meetings of this body held for some years. Reports of officers and Deputies indicated improved conditions in almost all subordinate branches, while the regular returns showed increased membership in many Divisions. A resolution was adopted endorsing the course pursued by the Temperance Alliance towards securing a better enforcement of the Prohibition Act. A special Propagation Committee was appointed, and ample funds placed at their disposal, for the purpose of carrying out the recommendation of the Grand Worthy Patriarch with regard to the extension of the boundaries and the scope of usefulness of the Order. SERIOUS OPERATION.—The many friends of Mrs. S. F. Tarbush in the city and country will be sorry to learn that she has been so seriously ill that she was required to undergo an operation and was removed to the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday morning. Last night the operation was reported successful and it was pleasing to learn that Mrs. Tarbush was resting comfortably.

PROHIBITION CASES ABANDONED.—Before His Honour Mr. K. J. Martin at the City Police Court on Thursday morning the adjourned cases against John McKenna, Elizabeth McMillan and Ronald Steele came up for trial. Mr. W. S. Stewart, K. C., appeared for McKenna who was also in Court. The prosecutor, Mr. Boiesner, was in attendance. When the case was called Mr. Bentley prosecuting attorney, failed to appear, as did also the detectives. The Magistrate adjourned the Court for three-quarters of an hour. At 9.45, on a resumption of the bench, he directed the clerk to call the case against Steele. Mr. Boiesner, in whose name the prosecution had been instituted, was asked whether he was ready to proceed. Mr. Bentley not having yet come up. In reply Mr. Boiesner said that he had no instructions from his counsel, nor had he any advice regarding the whereabouts of the witnesses, although he understood they had come from Summerside on Wednesday; and consequently he was entirely in the dark as to what steps he should take. The Magistrate enquired if him if he desired an adjournment of the case. Mr. Boiesner replied he did not see that he would be in any better position as he had no evidence to offer against Steele. This case was dismissed. The case against John McKenna was then called. Mr. Stewart, K. C., for McKenna, asked that the case be dismissed. He reminded the Court that he had already appeared on three occasions to proceed with the defence, on each occasion the case having been adjourned at the request of the prosecution; and inasmuch as he had every reason to believe that the detectives had come to Charlottetown, and as no explanation has been offered by the prosecution concerning their absence, he would ask His Honour to dismiss the case. Mr. Boiesner did not reply and the defendant was discharged. The case against Elizabeth McMillan was likewise dismissed. The defendant was not present.
