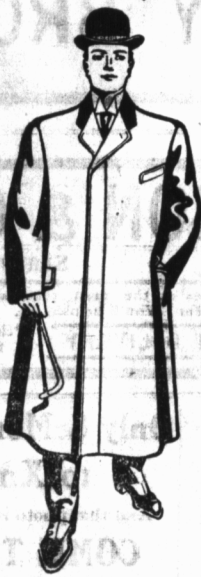

F. T. ARSENAULT, R. E. Gaudet, Edmond Arsenault, H. S. Sharpe, and James A. Sharpe, have applied for incorporation as a joint stock company for the purpose of carrying on a general merchandise business at Wellington.

The death took place on October 29 at 33 Portland street, St. John, N.B. of Arthur McGilvary, aged 68 years, after a weeks illness of pneumonia. Deceased formerly belonged to Cape Lavigne, Prince Edward Island.

The death took place at New York, October 22, after a brief illness, of John F. Dunn, formerly of Morell, Prince Edward Island. He leaves to mourn a son, a daughter, and a sister in Morell, besides a large number of relatives and friends. The funeral which took place on Wednesday, October 26th, was largely attended.

JAMES MCGILVARY, an old and respected resident of Malpeque, died Saturday afternoon from the effects of an accident sustained the previous evening. He had been driving home in a truck wagon and the horse taking fright, jumped to other side of the road, throwing Mr. McGilvary out. The wheel passing over his head, inflicting severe injuries. He was taken home at once and a doctor was called. He lingered until Saturday afternoon when he passed away.

It will be learned with regret by citizens of Summerside, that J. F. McMillan manager of the Royal Bank, has been transferred to the management of the branch in Charlottetown. Mr. McMillan has been a general favorite, not only in commercial circles but, as a citizen, and his departure is a distinct loss to the town. In addition to the management of the Charlottetown branch, Mr. McMillan will have supervision of all the Island branches. He is succeeded by R. B. Richardson who has for the past two years been accountant of the bank in Summerside. Mr. Richardson is to be congratulated on his well-deserved promotion.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held Monday evening. There was a full attendance. Sept. Sharp of the P. E. Island Railway was present, by invitation, and discussed the proposed winter time table with the Board. Mr. Sharp expressed the hope that a second train between Charlottetown and Summerside would be granted by the Department and promised to use his influence towards securing it. The Board urged the necessity of a second train between Summerside and Tignish and Mr. Sharp, although unable to make any promises, admitted the desirability of the service. Considerable correspondence was read and fully discussed. On the suggestion of J. A. Brace the Provincial Government was urged through representative Godkin and Clark to take immediate steps towards rebuilding the Summerside Court House.

By invitation from the Mayor the committee recently appointed to assist in the reorganization of the Fire Brigade, attended a meeting of the town council last night. C. I. McNeil outlined a scheme by which he hopes to have a volunteer brigade enrolled shortly. He suggested that a suitable room be secured which would be exclusively for the use of the firemen. The room could be suitably furnished with athletic fittings, suitable reading matter and such general furnishings, as would induce young men to volunteer. The mayor intimated that the council would not object to making any reasonable expenditure in this matter. A general discussion followed, in reference to the widening of the streets. The opinion expressed both by the council and committee was that immediate steps should be taken before rebuilding commenced to straighten Filzroy Street.

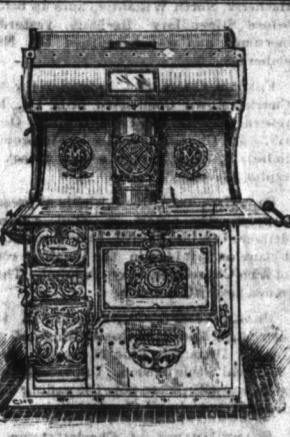
