—A WELCOME VICTOR.—Mr. Edmund Pineau of Rustico, son of Theophilus Pineau, paid a visit to Egmond Bay last Friday, returning Saturday morning, accompanied by his brother, Coraclus Pineau, teacher at Urbanville. As previously reported in The Guardian, Mr. Pineau is a graduate of the Aviation School, and his visit to the Island was one of farewell to his people before crossing overseas. Before he volunteered, he was attending the Agricultural College and already had won distinction, having also captured several diplomas in the commercial college. Notwithstanding his brilliant college career and a smiling future before him, Edmund lent an ear to the call of his country and as was anticipated his success as an aviation student has been excellent. His many friends at home and abroad will extend to him the best wishes during his sojourn in Europe, and may he be spared to return to his home and to his college studies, where he gave promise of brilliant achievements.

—SCHOOL MEETING.—Inspector Gallant met the teachers of Egmond Bay, also several school trustees at St. Philip Hall on Friday evening to discuss the advisability of holding a school fair in Egmond Bay some time this summer or fall. The Inspector, who presided, explained at some length the nature and purpose of such a movement and forcibly impressed on his hearers the great benefit accruing from it. He quoted from reports of other provinces how the number of school fairs were increasing every year. He also explained how to organize and said that while an advisory committee of teachers and trustees was essential, the chief aim was to let school pupils carry out the program as much as possible. The school fair was a competition between the pupils and so under the supervision of the advisory committee the work of producing exhibits or preparing such for the fair should be left to them. Rev. Father Gossett heartily supported the movement and said he understood school work such as writing, drawing, etc., would also be shown; this, he said, would be an excellent way of stimulating rivalry between schools. Mr. X. D. Gallant was also strongly in support of the proposed scheme. The small school exhibitions held in connection with the larger one last fall had been a decided success. He had taken a great interest in seeing his own children preparing home plots and further bringing exhibits to the exhibition. To encourage them for another year and to teach them the remuneration of earnest and assiduous labor he thought it advisable to purchase from them the products of their year's work. He had paid to each of them the market price of all they had to dispose of. He would support heartily the school fair. Mr. Moise Gallant, teacher, was also in favor of a school fair. A unanimous vote was then passed to proceed with the organization. The advisory committee was then named, and a date set in the next week for them to meet when the election of officers between the pupils will take place and also other matters will be discussed. Miss Angela Arsenault recorded the minutes of the meeting. M

CANADIAN RAID NETTED PRISONERS

CANADIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS, May 15.—Early yesterday morning seven strong raiding parties of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick troops, entering the enemy outpost line at Neuville-Vitasse village, inflicted many casualties on the Boches, and, in addition, captured some prisoners and two machine guns.

The raid was carried out at three o'clock, with only flares to light the intense blackness, and with the ground deep in mud from the heavy rains. Save in a few instances, the Boche left his outpost line and made a hasty retreat for the rear.

Our men struggled over the muddy ground. Progress was slow but sure. The first party, after advancing 150 yards, was held up by wire which it was unable to cut completely, when our signal to retire sounded. Another party gained the support line, but the enemy had made a hurried retreat. A third party found two dead Boches, but no live ones. The next group had better success. Encountering a hostile machine gun post with a garrison of three men they rushed it. All the Germans in it were killed by the same Canadian who bayoneted two and shot the third. The machine gun was brought back to our lines.

Near the Beaureains-Neuville-St. Vitasse Road two enemy garrisons offered a stout resistance until all were

JAPAN MAY BE CALLED ON TO PLAY STRONGER PART IN THE WAR

LONDON, May 13.—An interchange of messages between Baron Goto, the new Japanese foreign minister, and the British foreign office, is seen by the Daily Telegraph as a happy omen, emphasizing the value and reality of the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

"It is well," the paper says, "that we should be reminded from time to time of the mutual obligations between London and Tokio, obligations which have been fulfilled punctiliously on both sides and recognized fully by the leading statesmen of both countries as a peculiarly binding force. The time may soon come, perhaps it already has arrived, when Japan may be called upon to play a strong and resolute part in the war. In such a contingency she must be assured of our sympathy if she takes whatever she deems to be the proper steps for protecting allied interests in the far east."
