ISLAND BRED 2:30 TROT AND PACE STAKES

Without doubt the Island bred 2:30 trot and pace stake, which closed recently, has the largest list of entries ever given a race on P. E. Island. This stake has been got up for the sole purpose of encouraging the training of horses on the Island—the kind which eventually win, as the Mainlanders say.

At first there were two stakes named—viz 2:30 trot and 2:30 pace, but the trot failed to gain sufficient support to warrant its being carried through (as the purses have to be made up mostly from the entry fees). The nominators in the pace, in a sportsmanlike way characteristic of Island horsemen, unanimously consented to have the trotters come in with them. The trotting men were notified, and up to the day of the second payment, none have asked for their entry fee paid in, so it has been taken for granted that they are willing to stay in and boost the race, which will most likely be the best of its kind in Eastern Canada.

No one expects the race to be won in anything but ordinary time, as the possible candidates have not shown any speed that would keep a horse out, who can or will show 2:25 speed. Although the stake has a very big entry, the two-year-old stake promises to exceed it by many, and after the first payment, March 7th, the list of nominations will be published.

debted to the City Clerk and the various officials for the efficient and businesslike way in which they had performed their duties during the year. In conclusion, His Worship said that it had always been a great pleasure to him to preside at the meetings of the Council, perfect harmony having existed between the Councillors and himself throughout his term of office. He hoped his successor would find in the next Council as genial and courteous a body as the present Council had been; if he did, the new year would be a happy one. Mr Paton in the House as representative—a gentleman who had been on the Council and knew the conditions—this matter would receive every attention, and they could rest assured they would have the sympathy of the Government. Councillor Riley referred to various items on the financial statement, and in conclusion expressed his appreciation of His Worship the Mayor's services during the year. Mayor Sterns, he said, had always

been exceedingly courteous and pleasant in his dealings with the Councillors and if he decided to retire he (Mr Riley) was sure he would do so with the respect and confidence of every citizen. His Worship deserved well of the city, and had occupied the chair with dignity and credit to himself and the city.
Councillor Jenkins also made complimentary reference to the Mayor and remarked on the great use which the motor sprinkler had, been to the city.
Councillors McKenna, McNevin, Miller, McKenzie, Wright and Rattray also congratulated the Mayor on the success with which he had discharged the duties of his office. His Worship replied, thanking the Councillors for their appreciative remarks in regard to himself and expressing the hope that the incoming Council would be as competent and painstaking as the present.

Before the Council rose Councillor Jenkins referred to the rumour which had been circulated around the city that the western capital was trying to take some of the soldiers away from Charlottetown. If any body of men left Charlottetown, he said, the city as a whole would be affected, and they should do whatever they could to hold up the hands of their representatives in preventing this step. He did not know whether the Council would take any action in this matter, but if they could he thought they should do so without delay. The Council decided to look into the matter at once. The Council then adjourned.
