GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC TERMS OF AGREEMENT

More Favorable to the Company Than Were Before Announced—All Sections to Be Proceeded With at Once—Commission to Supervise the Construction—Same Route to Maritime Ports.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC AGREEMENT.

OTTAWA, July 30—(Special)—The Grand Trunk agreement provides that the road shall extend from Moncton to Port Simpson, the Government building from Moncton to Winnipeg and the Grand Trunk Pacific the remainder.

THE TERMS OF THE LEASE.

The eastern section will be leased for fifty years, the first seven years to be free, the next three years to give the Government the net earnings and if these are not equal to three percent the deficit is to be added to capital.

The remaining forty years three percent must be paid to the Government.

ACOMMISSION OF SUPERVISION.

A Commission will supervise the work of construction of the western section.

THE GOVERNMENT GUARANTEE.

The Grand Trunk must build the western section in seven years, the Government guaranteeing 75 per cent of the cost up to \$13,000 per mile on the prairie section and \$30,000 per mile on the mountain section.

The principal and interest are to be guaranteed for fifty years.

AS THE WORK PROGRESSES.

On the completion of the prairie section the road will commence paying interest on the guaranteed bonds, but there will be no interest on the mountain section for seven years. After that the net earnings for three years will be paid and then three percent.

A MORTGAGE—THE EQUIPMENT.

The Government will take a first mortgage on the western section. The Grand Trunk is required to equip

GREAT SHOWING OF C. P. RAILWAY

Company Has a Surplus for the Year Ended of Nearly \$4,000,000—The Rush to Canada.

Montreal, July 29.—(Special)—The Star's London correspondent cables:

"The results of the Canadian Pacific year astonish even the Canadian Pacific's friends. The surplus, after ordinary dividends, is \$4,776,400, being considerably in excess of expectations. English financial writers say the question with the shareholders now is whether the directors should not increase the dividend or asset to a bonus seeing that the surplus fund would be otherwise increased to nearly \$15,000,000.

"The correspondent of the Frankfurter Zeitung controvert Mr. Chamberlain's assertion that certain Glasgow firms owned Canadian orders for locomotives to Canada's preferential treatment of English imports, and declares that the Canadian railways in urgent need of locomotives placed their orders exclusively with a view to rapid delivery. He states that the Chemnitz and Kgl. Maschinenbau works also received Canadian orders.

"The Prince of Wales having at his disposal £500, the proceeds of the recent cookery food exhibited, has decided to divide the money among four families desirous of emigrating to Canada under the self-help scheme of the East End Emigration fund.

A revenue official writing to the Times shows that an ad valorem duty of five per cent on food from foreign ports, and seven per cent duty on foreign manufactures for purposes of retaliation would provide sufficient revenue to enable Britain to abolish the existing taxes on sugar, tea, coffee, cocoa and dried fruits with a surplus margin of \$1,000,000. In other words Mr. Chamberlain's proposals could be carried out without adding a farthing to the working man's domestic budget.

"Canadian emigration continues phenomenal. The Canadian Pacific report that no first or second-class accommodation is available on their steamers before September, while the second-class is full till even a later period."

THE FERRY COMPANY'S CHARTER. OTTAWA, July 30—(Special)—The Railroad Committee today cleared up its order paper.

The Bill for incorporation of the Prince Edward Island Railway and Ferry Company was amended so as to give the Company a general ferry power in the Northumberland Straits, instead of the specific route from Cape Traverse to Cape Tormentine.

COMPULSORY VOTING FAVORED. The Dominion Elections Committee decided to recommend a law providing for compulsory voting, depriving of the franchise those who refuse to vote.

ROSS WILL NOT RETIRE. MONTREAL, July 30—(Special)—Beyond denying that he had any intention of retiring from the presidency of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, Jas. Ross would say nothing today.

COMPANY'S STOCK DECLINES. It is generally accepted on the street that matters have reached a crisis. The bonds and preference stock both declined two points today.

C. P. R. STEAMER ASHORE. The Canadian Pacific steamer Lake Manitoba went aground in the river this morning.

Little trouble is anticipated in getting her off, although a portion of the cargo may have to be lightered.

AGED LEGISLATOR DEAD. HALIFAX, July 30—(Special)—Hon. Thos. Johnson, M.P.P., for Shelburne died this morning.

He was the Nestor of the House of Assembly, being eighty-two years of age.

THE EXPLOSION AT LOWELL. LOWELL, July 30—(Special)—The deaths by the explosion are now placed at 25, with as many more injured. Thirteen houses were demolished and thirty more partially wrecked.
