the expert, who is quoted as saying, the farmers have no knowledge of cranberries, and lack of sand in the country makes the Island not suitable.

Another ridiculous thing was the report on page 11 that Hungarian partridges had been introduced and would clear the potato fields of bugs. (Laughter).

Matters of education, especially on agricultural lines were dealt with by Mr. Arsenault, also the Provincial Government's promise of Old Age Pensions, Education and Prohibition. The waste of the snow plough, purchased last year, was all ably dealt with.

Premier Lea

Hon. Mr. Lea gave a lengthy speech in which he dwelt on finance and the road policy.

Coming to prohibition, he said that the people seemed to demand a 100 per cent enforcement of the prohibition law, but did not demand it of

THE GYPSUM INDUSTRY OF CANADA

The increasing importance of the gypsum industry in Canada is evidenced by the fact the production has increased over 155 per cent in quantity and 347 per cent in value during the last 20 years.

Although the export trade in crude gypsum still forms a large proportion of the industry, it is gratifying to see that the home consumption is steadily increasing and while the percentage of the crude gypsum is less than 20 per cent, its value is practically 50 per cent of the total gypsum production of the whole country.

Canada has within her borders extensive deposits of high grade gypsum and some of these have been operated for many years; in fact the discovery of gypsum in Nova Scotia was the first in North America.

The Mines Branch of the Department of Mines, Ottawa, issued in 1915 a report on "Gypsum in Canada," which covered the operations up to that date, but the rapid changes and advance made in the technology of gypsum since that time have been such that an entirely new publication on this subject has been prepared and is now available for distribution.

This publication, entitled "The
