Sad Death at Cape Traverse.

CAPE TRAVERSE, July 7.—(Special)—Newton Muttart was formed hanging in his Brother Robert's barn about 5 o'clock a. m. Saturday morning. It is supposed he got up about 4 o'clock, went to the barn got rope, tied it around a beam in the barn and slowly lowered himself down until it tightened as his neck was not dislocated and very little signs of struggling.

His brother noticed the lifeless body suspended from the beam about 5 and he at once cut the body down, and it was believed that breath had just left the remains, as they were quite warm.

Nothing unusual was noticed on the deceased man. On Friday night he retired at the usual time after, eating lunch before going to bed.

Dr. Dougherty held an inquest at once. The jurymen were as follows: A Strang, foreman, M. Clark, Jas. Clark, Thos. Clark, L. Hennessy, G. Bell, and Chas. Bell.

Evidence showed the deceased had suicided by hanging. He was 45 years of age and leaves a wife but no family. He was buried at the Methodist Cemetery at 5 p. m. on Saturday, and had a large funeral.

The deceased was the third son of Capt. Lewis Muttart, of Cape Traverse, who for many years so successfully commanded the ice boat service between that point and Cape Tormentine. He was one of the unfortunate boatmen who some ten years ago had to remain out in the ice boats over night and when so many suffered the loss of fingers and toes. The deceased lost both of his feet from the instep and from that sad time has been in weak health both mentally and physically.
