SOMEWHERE IN YUGOSLAVIA, July 17—(Delayed)—(CP)—Maj. Randolph Churchill, Capt. Evelyn Waugh, four Russian officers and myself were fortunate survivors when our transport plane crashed from 400 feet and burst into flames in Yugoslavia.

We are being cared for in Partisan hospitals and billets. Our crew who perished were members of British and Dominion forces.

Maj. Churchill, son of the Prime Minister, and Capt. Waugh, novelist, are members of the British mission to Marshal Tito's Partisans. The Russians also were en route to Partisan headquarters.

This dispatch by a British correspondent did not disclose whether Churchill or Capt. Waugh were injured.

A funeral service for the late Mrs. Christina Maclean Bath, who died in a Saskatoon hospital Tuesday of last week, following a knee operation, was held in the Masonic Hall, Elrose, Saturday afternoon, June 17, at 2 p. m., with Rev. W. C. McBride of Rosetown Presbyterian Church in charge, assisted by Rev. E. T. Montour of Elrose.

The hall was filled with neighbors and friends who had come to pay their last respects to one who, for nearly 30 years, has been held in the highest esteem amongst them. A further tribute to their affection was seen in the masses of beautiful flowers which banked the casket and the platform. Two favorite old hymns were sung, "Oh God, Our Help in Ages Past", and "Lead, Kindly Light."

Pall-bearers were J. Orleron, J. Mesrobie, J. W. Thompson, J. Bone, G. Faud and S. Morrison. Burial was made in the Elrose cemetery.

Christina Maclean was born of Scottish parentage at Long Creek, Lot 65, Prince Edward Island, and her love for the Island colored much of her conduct. In 1912 she crossed the Dominion to Vancouver, but returned the following year to Saskatoon.

She was married on June 16, 1915, they were married at Knox Church. They came to farm in the High Point district near Gansworth, where she had excellent health. 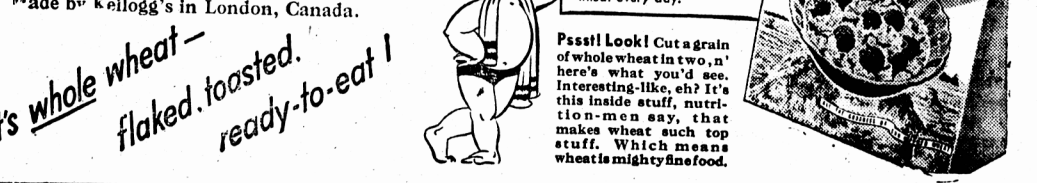
