It is pleasing to report that Mr. W. K. McGougan of Summerside, who has been seriously ill for some time, is somewhat improved.—S.

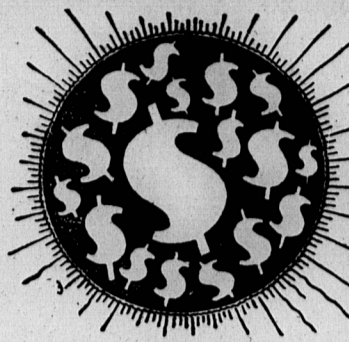
Mr. Sidney March, who recently returned from the United States, and is now working with Mr. Reginald Pope, has rented the Baptist Parsonage for the winter months.—S.

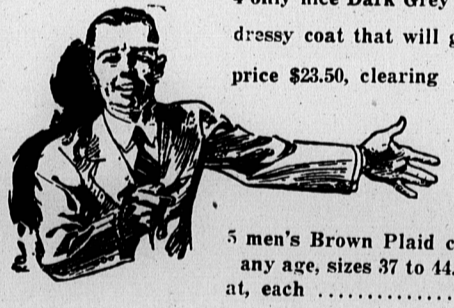

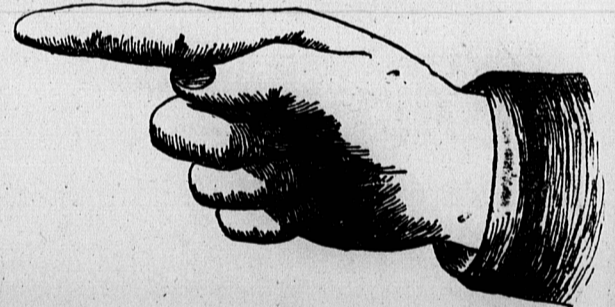
