BAIL OF \$10,000 DECLARED TO SMALL

MONTREAL, March 24.—(World's Special Service)—C. S. Reed, Thomas' bottle promoter, who was held on a charge of obtaining five thousand dollars by false pretences, and who was released last night provisionally on bail of ten thousand, appeared this morning before Judge Bazin, who absolutely refused ten thousand dollars as bail, intimating the amount was too small as thirty-seven thousand was said to be involved in Reed's transactions.

BUSINESS TIE-UP IN PARIS IS COMPLETE

PARIS, March 24.—There was not the slightest indication at 11.30 hour tonight of a break in the deadlock between the government and its striking employees of the postal department, nor was there any prospect of an improvement in the situation. The strike, however, will be made the subject of consideration in the Chamber of Deputies tomorrow.

The climax of the strike was reached tonight, when 5000 repairers, linemen and mechanics decided to join the strikers. These were the last remaining workmen employed by the postal administration.

The cabinet at its session tonight passed a decree authorizing the dis-

missal of its late employees of the state service and reaffirmed its determination not to yield. The semi-official note giving the result of this meeting also announces that many merchants have offered to lend to the government their employes to ensure the public services. This is indicative of the completeness of the tie-up.

Throughout the day the situation in the capital and the provinces grew worse with every hour. The undelivered letters number into the millions, and not less than 300,000 telegrams were stacked up this afternoon awaiting distribution. Foreign incoming mails remain unsorted, and only a small proportion of the outgoing mails have been sent away.

The government's attempt to restore the operations of the various branches of its service thus far have been unavailing.

The government has managed to keep several wires open with London and Berlin for the purpose of conducting important diplomatic negotiations now in progress. The telephone wires that were working last night are today out of commission.

A few days more of these conditions and Paris will be reduced almost to a state of siege, so far as food supplies are concerned. The funds necessary for the smooth running of the provincial trade are hung up in the post offices, and the supply of eggs, milk, butter, meat and country produce threatens speedily to cease.

The banks are withholding payment on checks, in the absence of advice from their correspondents and prices at the stores are soaring.

So far there has been no rioting. The real element of danger is to be found in the threat of the general confederation of labor, which is a purely revolutionary organization, and the railroad unions to declare sympathetic strikes.

Strangely enough, amid the intense anxiety in business and government circles, the masses celebrated St. Catherine today, the usual pleasure-loving crowds assembling in the boulevards to witness the grotesque procession and throw confetti.

Only the royalists seemed to get a grain of comfort out of the situation which their newspapers hail as a proof of the bankruptcy of the republic.

In order to prove their patriotism the strikers have detailed two expert operators to transmit the cipher which government is exchanging in connection with the Balkan crisis.

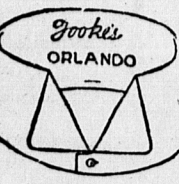

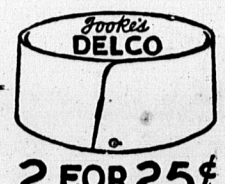

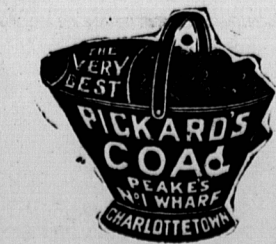
