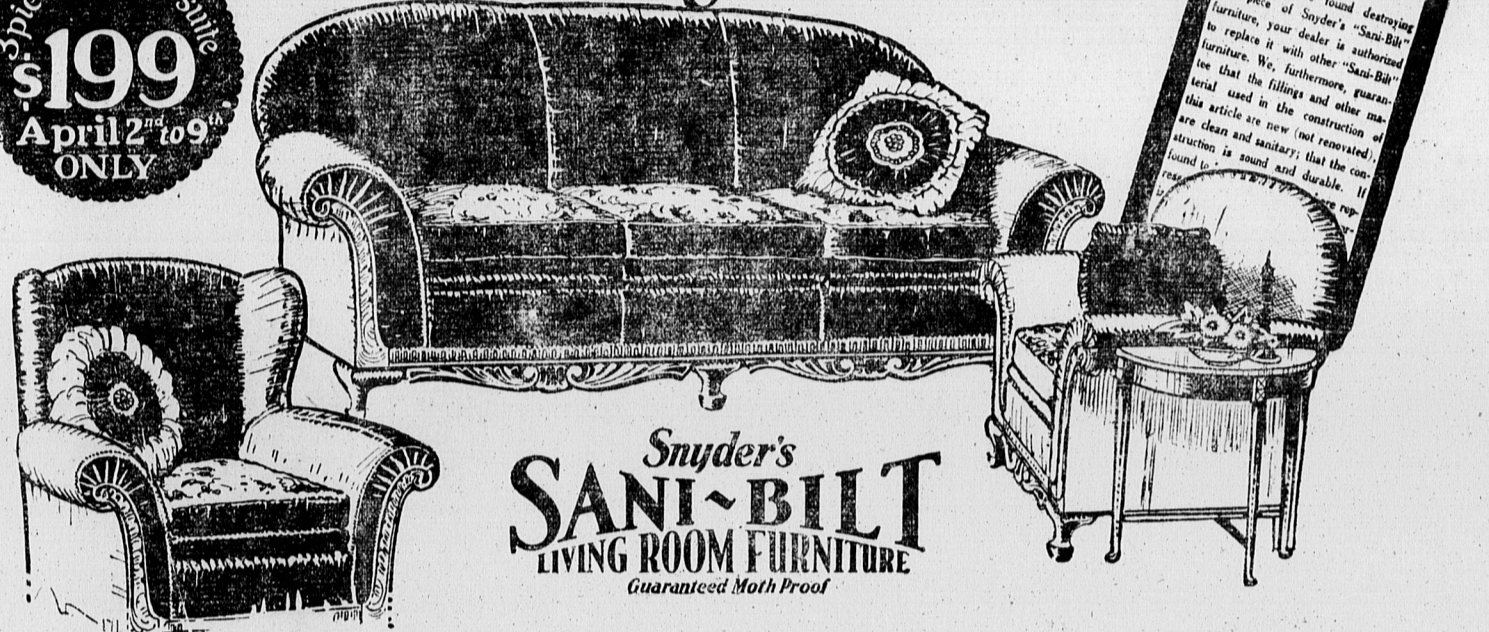

Some Legal (Continued from page 6) degree, hurt the nice feeling of honesty. JOHNSON: Why, no, sir, if you act properly. You are not to deceive your clients with false representations of your opinion; you are not to tell lies to a judge. BOSWELL: But what do you think of supporting a cause which you know to be bad? JOHNSON: Sir, you do not know it to be good or bad till the judge determines it. I have said that you are to state facts fairly so that your thinking, or what you call knowing, a cause to be bad must be from reasoning, must be from your supposing your arguments to be weak and inconclusive. But, Sir, that is not enough. An argument which does not convince yourself may convince the judge to whom you urge it; and if it does not convince him, why then, sir, you are wrong and he is right. It is his business to judge; and you are not to be confident in your own opinion that a cause is bad, but to say all you can for your client, and then hear the judge's opinion.

DOCTOR JOHNSON ON ADVOCACY The advocacy of a bad cause is a subject of further remarks by Dr. Johnson in a conversation which Boswell has recorded:—"We talked of the practise of the law. Sir William Forbes said never undertake a cause which he was satisfied was not a just one. Sir, said Johnson, a lawyer has no business with the justice or injustice of the cause which he undertakes, unless his client asks his opinion, and then he is bound to give it honestly. The justice or injustice of the cause is to be decided by the judge. Consider, sir, what is the purpose of courts of justice. It is that every man may have his cause fairly tried by men appointed to try causes. A lawyer is not to tell what he knows to be honesty? Is there not some danger that a lawyer may put on the same mask in common life, in the intercourse with his friends? JOHNSON: Why, no, sir. Ev-

of evidence, what shall be the result of legal argument. As it rarely happens that a man is fit to plead his own cause, lawyers are a class of the community who, by study and experience, have acquired the art and power of arranging the points at issue which the law has settled. A lawyer is to do for his client all that his client might fairly do for himself if he could. It is a superiority of attention, of knowledge, of skill, and a better method of communication, he has the advantage of his adversary. It is an advantage to which he is entitled. There must always be some advantage on one side or the other; and it is better that advantage should be had by talents than by chance. If lawyers were to undertake no causes till they were sure they were just, a man might be precluded altogether from a trial of his claim, though, were it judicially examined, it might be found a very just claim. These are just a few of the problems arising in the everyday practice of a lawyer. When you realize that our laborious days and sleepless nights are taken up in an attempt to solve such problems, always on behalf of others and never for ourselves, there is every reason for the poet to say "Honor the charge they made, pay them the bill they made, Noble Attorneys."
