PLAN PROTEST TO LEAGUE Lithuanians planned a protest to the League of Nations at German interference in Lithuania's domestic affairs over the sentencing of four Nazis to death for an alleged plot to seize Memel.

The League of Nations made public correspondence showing France will not permit Nazi brownshirts to occupy the demilitarized Saar area.

LONDON, March 28.—Although the British government still withholds details of the Anglo-German talks that took place in Berlin, it was increasingly evident tonight the visit has done nothing to bridge the gulf between the German and British attitudes to the question of collective security for Europe.

Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, made an eagerly awaited statement to the House of Commons today but he revealed nothing except what was already known unofficially; that "considerable divergences of opinion" were found to exist between the British and German conferees.

"Power Theory" It is becoming more and more clear that these "considerable divergences of opinion" are on fundamental principles. The situation, Reuters' political correspondent said tonight, seems to be crystallizing into one of the "power theory" as opposed to the collective security theory in European politics.

The task of British statesmen at the moment is to decide Britain's future attitude to the European problem in the light of the Berlin talks and the coming three-power conference at Stresa, Italy, and in this connection the present visits of Captain Anthony Eden, Lord Privy Seal, to Moscow, Warsaw and Praha will be vitally important.

It may be taken for granted, it was said here, that in the Moscow talks Russia will use the outcome of the Berlin conversations as an additional argument in support of

Substantial Increase In Government Deposits. OTTAWA, March 28.—The weekly statement issued today by the Bank of Canada showed substantial increases in government deposits, also in sterling and United States funds held by the bank. A STRANGE SUGGESTION "Another statement made by the member from Rustico was with regard to the Potato Growers' Association. He said he thought the Government should have gone quietly to the Bank and guaranteed the amount due to the Association to the Bank, without letting anybody know anything about it. Now, Mr. Speaker, the hon. gentleman has been a member of the Government. He has been sworn in; he knows what the oath of office is; yet he makes the suggestion, on the floor of this House, that the leader of the Government, should have gone around to the back door of the Bank, sneaked in and pledged the funds entrusted to him by the people of this Province as guarantee of the Association's indebtedness to the extent of eighty or ninety thousand dollars. I think that statement is unworthy of any member of this Chamber." (Loud applause.)

Mr. Lee's Inconsistency "I was interested," continued Mr. MacLean, "in an argument evolved by the leader of the Opposition when he was speaking of the overdraft they left at the Bank of more than a million dollars, and the increase in the debt in their time of \$1,177,000. He charged that a large part of that increase in debt was attributable to the Conservatives who had come before him, and that the Conservative government which followed him benefited to a large extent by his expenditure. His argument was based on the state-

ment of the Opposition to discredit the Government and win plaudits from the electors to the efforts of naughty little boys throwing stones at an orchard tree, after they had failed in their efforts to shake the limbs and bring down the fruit.

MR. LEPAGE'S MISSTATEMENT The member from Rustico (Mr. LePage) had made the statement that in three years—from Dec. 31, 1930, to Dec. 31, 1934—the public debt of the Province had increased \$1,854,000. "I would like," said Mr. MacLean, "to know just what significance these figures were intended to convey to this House. Of course the debt increased \$1,854,000; but the year 1931, as we know, was the last year of Liberal Government, and they went behind in that year \$548,000.

The leader of the Opposition, when speaking about the increase in debt in our time, put it down at \$2,207,000, and I was rather surprised that the member from Rustico should apparently be making an attempt to mislead the people by telling them it was twice as much as his own leader had stated." (Applause.)

Mr. LePage: "I quoted the Public Accounts." Hon. Mr. MacLean: "The statement, I submit, was misleading if it was intended to convey any argument at all. The period was part of my hon. friend's time, and part of ours."

C.C.F. LEADER CONTINUES BUDGET DEBATE

Takes Liberal Party To Task For Not Playing Fair With Electors. (C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 28.—Share-the-wealth program was launched in the House of Commons today by James S. Woodsworth, C. C. F. leader when he continued the Budget debate.

Mr. Woodsworth said the government's program was urged by the third-party leader. He criticized the income surtax announced in the budget as a delusion and could see no reason why an income of \$200,000 should not be cut to \$40,000 or \$50,000 by state taxes. The surtax would cut it to \$180,000, apart from other taxes.

"We have reached the point," Mr. Woodsworth declared, "when we shall have to regard the great resources and equipment of this country as essentially the property of the Canadian people to be administered for the needs of the masses."

Two other speakers took the floor today, J. A. Fraser (Cons., Carleton Place) and Dr. F. W. Gershaw (Lib., Medicine Hat). With the exception of Hon. J. L. Ralston, the financial critic, Dr. Gershaw was the first Liberal to speak.

Mr. Woodsworth said the government's "yes" and "no" had broken new legislative ground "but I submit the program offers no silver."

Frederick A. Pope, associate defence counsel, argued the printing of the record of the trial, approximately 7,800 typewritten pages, entailed considerable work, but the court remarked it was possible to speed up this work.

NEW LONDON JUSTICE-GENERAL NEW LONDON, March 28.—(Canadian Press)—The new justice general will be necessitated in the West Edinburgh Riding as a result of today's appointment of W. G. Norman, K.C., the sitting member, as Lord Justice-General of Scotland and Lord President of the Court of Session. He succeeds Lord Clyde, who held the position since 1920, and has now retired.

N.S. Government Has Over One Million Dollar Deficit

HALIFAX, March 28.—The hope of a balanced budget by 1938 was held out today by Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia as he announced an estimated deficit of \$1,040,232.97 for an extended fiscal year of 14 months.

At the same time, he told the Legislature in his budget speech, the estimated deficit this year would have been only \$807,000 had the end of the fiscal year not been moved from Sept. 30 to Nov. 30, giving the government an additional two months to account for in this budget.

STORM TROOPS DISMISSED

Brown-shirted Marchers Pass Into History. (C. P. Havas) BERLIN, March 28.—The Nazi Storm Troops as the "right arm" of the German government have passed into the history of the Third Reich. Compulsory military service has completed their decline, begun last June with the now historic "Roehm revolt."

It was learned today that the brown-shirted marchers who carried Adolf Hitler to power and held him there have been disarmed, that more than two thirds of them have been dismissed, and that those remaining will henceforth be considered "political workers," thus leaving the armed force of Germany in the hands of the Reichswehr.

The Storm Troops' chief, Victor Lutze, is said to have already resigned. About 1,000,000 of the 3,500,000 troopers who a year ago were the glory of the Nazi regime are all who remain in the ranks today.

The best of those dismissed, presumably, will be conscripted in Germany's new army. Those retained will be used as propaganda workers under local political chiefs. Those merely given their walking papers were slated to be dropped anyway.

Permanent Committee Of Mayors

OTTAWA, March 28.—At a dinner tendered the mayors of Canada by the City of Ottawa today it was decided to have a permanent committee of mayors with headquarters in Montreal. Mayor Camille Houde of Montreal was appointed chairman.

The committee was formed for the purpose of presenting the views of the mayors to the Dominion Government, it was said. Some speakers expressed disapproval of the attitude of the government in refusing to allow the delegation to appear before the bar of the House of Commons.
