A VALUABLE CARGO.—The schr. Excelsa sailed from Souris on the 4th inst., for St. Pierre, Miquelon with a cargo loaded by Messrs. H. H. Acorn and C. D. McKinnon, valued at over \$6,000, which consisted in part of 1,500 bus. potatoes, 500 bus. turnips, 268 bus. oats, 8 hbl. apples, 25 head of cattle, 16 crates poultry, 10 tons hay, 2 ft. plank, 50 dressed gogs, 46 sheep, 4 stoves and 8 cords wood. The cargo was consigned to the La Morn Franchals Co., of St. Pierre, and it was only due to the persistent efforts of Mr. Acorn that the ship arrived at all as the owners threw up the charter owing to a number of marine mishaps. By a telegram to Mr. Acorn it was learned that the ship arrived safely at her destination.—S.

A SAD DEATH.—A very sad event occurred in Souris Sunday night causing the death of one person and leaving another in a most critical condition. It seems that Mr. S. P. Campbell after attending Church Sunday morning and having had dinner laid down on a lounge to rest—having previously, it being a very cold day, filled his base burner with coal. The stove emitted such a quantity of gas that it filled the room, causing Mr. and Mrs. Campbell to become unconscious. On Monday morning the neighbors seeing no one moving about forced an entrance, and found both the victims unconscious. Mr. Campbell partially regained consciousness but Mrs. Campbell expired Tuesday afternoon. They were among the most respected citizens and well advanced in years.—S.
