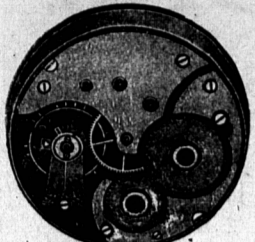

The marriage took place at the Baptist Parsonage, Middleboro Mass., by Rev. Mr. Williams on Nov. 5th, of Miss Maggie A. McNevin, daughter of Nicholas McNevin, Bonshaw P. E. I. and Harding C. Angus of South Framingham, Mass.

The new Methodist church at Miltown, N. B., was dedicated on Sunday last. Rev. Dr. Sprague preached at the 11 o'clock service, and Rev. W. W. Brewer in the evening. The congregation crowded the building at every service. The pastor, Rev. G. W. Fisher, to whose zeal and energy the new edifice is largely due, appealed to the congregation for a collection of \$200 during the day. The collection in the morning amounted to \$204 and in the evening to about \$110, making considerably more than was asked for. The church has somewhat greater seating capacity than the old, and is a beautiful structure, the interior being especially attractive.

A CORNWALLIS, N. S., despatch says.—The old parish of Cornwallis had the honor of having the first service of the "laying on of hands" by the new bishop of the diocese. His lordship arrived in the parish yesterday morning and proceeded first to Kingsport, where his first confirmation service was held in the afternoon eight candidates being confirmed. The evening service was held in the parish church, when the rector, Rev. T. C. Mellor, presented his second class of twenty-four candidates, to His Lordship for the Apostolic rite of confirmation. His Lordship's address to the candidates, which was listened to by a large congregation, was earnest and practical and produced a good effect. Previous to the service an address of welcome was presented, to which His Lordship made a suitable reply.

The most recent intelligence from sugar centres is to the effect that the situation has somewhat improved. Sugar producers, it appears, have already disposed of some 130,000 tons of the early product and have orders to the extent of some 200,000 tons. Large profits are in sight, and it is natural to suppose that the planters will continue to take their cue from the European market. Despite this, however, there seems reason to believe that the great advance will be checked for the present. But those who are in a position to speak authoritatively, say that even much higher levels must yet be attained to bring about a forced reduction in consumption. Once there is a reduction in consumption the advance in price must stop, and that consequence appears inevitable under the present figures. A wild speculation will doubtless continue to run its course on the European sugar exchange for some time to come. The beet crops are now virtually finished. No advance affecting the Canadian market has been heard of for the last two days.

Flour is sky-high, sugar is up to almost the top notch and not to be outdone codfish, the good old reliable salt codfish of commerce has made a jump that beats all records. From the vessel today salt cod are being sold at five dollars per hundred pounds, a figure that for this season of the year is unprecedented. A South wharf merchant remarked to the Star today that he had been in business on that wharf thirty-eight years and in all that time had only on one occasion known the price to approach the present figure at this season. For the year the occasion referred to was over thirty years ago. It is not uncommon for codfish to advance in price in the spring, last spring as high as \$4.85 being quoted, but it is remarkable to have the price up at this season when, as a rule, the supply is plentiful. The occasion of the present stiff price, unlike sugar and flour, the work of speculators, is that the catch during the summer was small and that in consequence it is difficult to secure a supply of good grade fish.—St. John Star.

PLANT STEAMSHIP LINE MATTERS

President Perry says Builders of the Halifax Submit Plans for a new Steamer.

Mr. Perry, president of the Canada Atlantic and Plant line steamship company is in Halifax. He will return to Boston today or Wednesday. Mr. Perry recently returned from Europe, where he had expected to purchase a new steamer for the Boston-Halifax route, and purchase or charter another to take the place of the Halifax in January, February and March, when she will be running to the West Indies. He did not find any of the steamers suitable. Some were of too light draught while in others the passenger accommodation was not all that Mr. Perry required. Before he left England he arranged the plans for a new steamer should be forwarded to him at Boston. He expects that one set of plans submitted by the builders of the Halifax have arrived in Boston. They are for a steamer about fifty feet longer than the Halifax, and with four sets more beam, and the same speed (14 knots). Mr. Perry says he is satisfied that in the world over there cannot be found as staunch a craft as suitable for the Boston-Halifax trade as the Halifax. He expects to complete this week the charter of a steamer to replace her on the route the first three months of the year. Nov. 22.
