MURINE EYES. Will Make Effort To Meet Deadline

PARIS, Sept. 24—An American delegation source said the Foreign Ministers Council agreed tonight to limit debate in peace conference proceedings, in an effort to meet the Oct. 15 deadline for adjournment.

At a four-hour meeting, the source said, the Big Four agreed to propose the establishment of "limitations on the length and number of speeches" in the peace conference and "a possibility of applying the rule of closure on any given committee."

The council adopted a timetable for completion of committee work by Oct. 5, the informant said. Adjournment of the conference by Oct. 15 would give delegates time to journey to Lake Success, N. Y., for the scheduled opening Oct. 23 of the United Nations General Assembly.

The conference's military commission, which is to meet in London, voted 11 to 7 in favor of identifying Bulgaria's southern frontier with Greece.

The announced purpose of the council meeting was to discuss a list of proposed peace treaty amendments on which the four countries have only slight disagreements.

However, conference sources said there was a probability that other important matters would be discussed, including disposition of Italy's colonies.

Described As Richest Man In The World

DAR-ES-SALAAM, Tanganyika, Sept. 24—(Reuters)—Dr. Thorburn Williamson of Montreal and Quebec tonight was described as "probably the richest man in the world" following official confirmation that a diamond mine he discovered in Tanganyika is eight times as large as Kimberley.

Dr. Williamson, a quiet, studious scientist, is a graduate of McGill University, Montreal, and a geologist with the Quebec Geological Survey.

London diamond producers said today that Dr. Williamson's discovery was "probably the epoch-making." They said there was indication that his mine would be worth more than the Kimberley or Brazilian mines.

Dr. Williamson came to Tanganyika in 1934 and pegged claims at various points in a diamond-bearing area. He discovered a central diamond-bearing "pipe" in the area.

It is reported that machinery now on order will enable the Williamson mine's output to reach 100 tons of diamond-bearing diggings daily.

Torso Slaying Trial Opens October 7

HAMILTON, Sept. 24—(CP)—Trial of three Hamilton residents for murder in last winter's torso-slaying of John Dick, 40-year-old railway street railway operator, starts Oct. 7 before Mr. Justice H. Barlow and a petit jury. A grand jury late today brought in true bills in murder charges against Mrs. Evelyn Dick, 25-year-old widow of the slain man, her mother, Mrs. M. J. Dick, 57, and steelworker friend of Mrs. Dick, William Bohozuk, 27. Bohozuk returned true bills in a murder charge against Mrs. Dick and Bohozuk in connection with the death of a newborn baby.

The macabre details and mystery-thriller development of the case started interest and gossip in Hamilton as perhaps no other case has done in the city's 100-year history. For four days the torso lay unidentified on a morgue slab as police probed for clues. Then two of Dick's brothers-in-law, John and Jacob Wahl of Beamsville, Ont., viewed the body, spotted birthmarks and scars and identified it as that of the Russian-born street railway operator who had been missing here for two weeks.

Identification of the half-underwear-clad torso sent police to question Dick's port, dark-eyed widow. Their questioning led to the arrest of Mrs. Dick, her partner and Bohozuk and later to their arraignment on murder charges. Police also charged MacLean with theft of money and goods from the tramway company.

Carloads Of Bananas For The Maritimes

(By The Canadian Press) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Sept. 24—Carloads of bananas being unloaded from the S.S. Junior at West Saint John as the United Nations Security Council. Captain A.E. Martin, Montreal, president and managing director of the Canadian Banana Co. Ltd., said today. Loss through spoiling and handling has been kept at a minimum and nothing has been disposed of that is fit for food, he said, in commenting upon reports that large quantities were being dumped outside the city because of spoilage.

Unloading of the Junior, the first banana boat to come here in more than four years, is continuing at shed No. 2 and so far, Mr. Martin said, only two truck loads have been dumped.

Royal Interest Shown In Jr. Red Cross

The honey, which was a present from an Englishman in the Argentine, has been sent to the National Institute for the Blind for distribution to the five Sunshine Homes for Blind Children in England which have been adopted by the Canadian Juniors.

Princess Elizabeth, who is Patroness of the Canadian Junior Red Cross, takes keen interest in the work of the members and in the past two years has asked the Canadian Red Cross Society overseas to distribute gifts on behalf of the Canadian Juniors.
