C. P. R. CONDUCTOR THROWN UNDER WHEELS

PERTH JUNCTION, N. B., Feb. 22.—George Smith, C. P. R. conductor, met with a serious accident here this morning, narrowly escaping death. Mr. Smith had orders to deliver to his engineer, which prevented him from catching the train until it had gained considerable headway. He attempted to climb on a box car but had been done so he would have been thrown against the bridge. He then grasped the railing of the front end of the van. His hand slipped and he fell across the rails, his head on one side and his body on the other. The box struck him before the wheel reached his body. He was rolled along under the trucks for a considerable distance. His head was cut in four places, one cut necessitated six stitches, and a second, four. Mr. Smith is a resident of St. Andrews but cannot be moved there for some time.

BRITISH ISLES SWEEP BY A SEVERE STORM

LONDON, Feb. 22.—A fierce gale has swept over the British Isles doing an immense amount of damage. The harbors are all crowded with shipping seeking shelter. Incoming vessels report extremely rough passages. The Adriatic gale at Plymouth, experienced a succession of gales all the way across the Atlantic. The Mauretania, after a long delay, succeeded in embarking her mails at Queenstown but was unable to land her pilot, who was taken to New York. Reports received tell of the wreck of a large number of small craft.

MONTREAL, Feb. 22.—Leading railroad officials here today denied the report, emanating from New York, that negotiations between the trainmen and conductors of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific had been broken off and a strike vote was being taken. PERTH JUNCTION, N. B., Feb. 22.—Constable G. K. McCrae has again won distinction by the capture of Xavier Terriault, a French desperado, who for the past three years has defied the police of Edmundston and terrorized the neighborhood hereabouts. Constable McCrae left here about 12 p. m. Thursday on Monday and the irons on his man. Terriault was convicted three years ago for illegal selling of liquor and fined fifty dollars. He refused to pay and when Sheriff Gagnon and posse of four men went to arrest him they were met by a volley of bullets. Terriault has since been hunted continually, so much so that he left his farm and built a hut, two miles in the woods, where, guarded by two guns and a dog, he has lived in defiance ever since. When a stranger approached he would cover them with a revolver and demand their business. He used the same methods when hauling produce or on entering a store, stating that he would kill any who molested him and kill himself before he would be arrested.

EFFORT TO BREAK THE COAL TRUST

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 22.—Standing in the United States Circuit Court for five hours today, James G. Reynolds, special assistant to the United States attorney general, recited the alleged iniquities of the so-called anthracite coal trust and charged that seven of the nine coal-carrying railroads entering the hard coal fields of Pennsylvania are in a conspiracy to stifle trade.

Judges Grey, Buffington and Lanning who are sitting in the case, gave unusually close attention to the case. Mr. Reynolds laid great stress upon the part the Temple Iron Company has played in the coal fields, declaring that its organization clearly showed a conspiracy among the coal roads to control the anthracite trade to tide-water at New York.

The company, in turn, acquired the latest of the independent mines and the proposed railroad to tide-water never was built. This act, Mr. Reynolds said, was one step in the alleged scheme to stifle interstate commerce in the coal trade. He also described the acquisition by the Reading Railway and the Reading Coal and Iron Company of the Jersey Central railroad, a competing line to New York harbor which, in turn, owned the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre Company. This Reading-Jersey Central combination, he said, owned 63 per cent of the unmined coal in the anthracite regions and was another step in the conspiracy.
