O'Rourke's Homer Spells Defeat For Haligonian Nine

Veteran Backstop Springhill Squad Hits Four-Base Wallop In Sixth To Give Mates 2-1 Victory In First Game Of Series.

SPRINGHILL, N. S., Sept. 28.—A smashing four-base wallop from the big bat of the aging Hank O'Rourke gave Springhill Fencibusters a 2-1 victory today over Halifax Willow Parks in the first game of their series for the Nova Scotia baseball crown.

When his mates were chalking up their scores, LeBlanc was holding Halifax hitless. Willow Parks couldn't fathom his southpaw hooks and for seven innings they failed to touch him.

Parks Score in Ninth

Their lone score came in the ninth. Hoppie McDonald punched out a long triple to right, and scored as the relay trickled through third-baseman Midge O'Brien's hands. It looked like Halifax's chance to even things, but there was one out then and the game ended as the next two batters went out on high flies.

Although defeated today, Parks were hopeful of evening the series in the next game.

The Halifax team had travelled a long, hard road to the finals. Protests and counter-protests had made their semi-final series with Yarmouth one of the most bitterly-fought in years. Finally, they were eliminated and Yarmouth squared off against Springhill.

But after two games of this "final" round had been played, a ruling of President C. C. Gillespie of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. sent Parks back into the finals. They defeated Gateways in a sudden death game on the neutral Middleton field, and gained the right at last to meet Springhill.

ASSOCIATED PRESS ALL-STAR TEAM PICKED

The Mighty 'Babe' Passes Out of All-Star Baseball Team Picture With Only Three Votes In His Favor.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—The outstanding three major league ball players of the year, on the basis of final returns in the Associated Press all-star poll, are manager Joe Cronin of Washington Senators, southpaw Carl Hubbell of New York Giants and slugger Chuck Klein of the Phillies.

They dominate the balloting by sports editors and writers. In the total of 89 votes cast, Cronin is named by 88 for the all-star shortstop role, Hubbell by 84 for the no. 1 pitching position and Klein by 81 for the post of duty in right field, where no longer is Babe Ruth even a challenger of the Phillies flogger.

The passing of Ruth from the all-star picture, with only three votes on his behalf for old time's sake, is one of the year's outstanding developments, along with the fact that only one Yankee, catcher Bill Dickey, wins a place in the lineup.

Seven American Leaguers and five National League stars make up the first team in the Associated Press consensus. The pennant-winning Giants and Senators each place two men.

Hubbell's battery-mate, Gus Mancuso, chiefly on the strength of his ability to handle pitchers so skillfully, squeezes into the second backstop job by a narrow voting margin over Mickey Cochrane of the Athletics and Virgil Davis of the Phillies. This was the closest contest in the entire balloting.

Cronin and Al Crowder, hard-working right-handed pitcher, represent the American League champions on the honor roll.

At first base, the great Jimmie Foxx, powerhouse of the Athletics, holds a decisive victory over his Yankee rival, Lou Gehrig, with Manager Bill Terry of the Giants third in a three-cornered contest. Foxx compiled a 3-to-1 margin over Gehrig in the voting.

Apparently on the strength of his harder hitting this year Charley Gehring of the Tigers scored with unexpected ease over Frankie Frisch, manager of the Cardinals in a race for the second-base position. Gehring had a 2-to-1 edge in the ballots.

One vote for Dick Bartell of the Phillies was the only thing that prevented it from being unanimous for Cronin at shortstop. Pie Traynor, the Pirate veteran, won over a National League rival, Pepper Martin, at third, although the Pepper's showing is a remarkable tribute to his performance in his first season at this position.

The outfield of Al Simmons, of the Braves and Klein proved easy for the experts. No one else was even close to this trio.

Similarly the selection of Lefty Grove of the A's, as the pitching mate of Hubbell and Crowder, was decisive. The old fireballer of the White Elephants is still conceded to be the American League's outstanding boxman. Cantwell, Whitehill and Dean were next in popular favor among the flingers.

Warning To Maritime Girl Athletes

HALIFAX, Sept. 28.—Aroused by what they considered interference with girls' sport in the Maritime Provinces, officers of the Maritime Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada, have issued a warning to girls under their jurisdiction. In the announcement was a telegram confirming the body's right to govern all women's sports, from Mrs. R. J. Foster, of Edmonton, Dominion president.

The telegram pointed out that "outlaw" teams or athletes were not recognized by the Association and the local body added to that a warning to all girl athletes to register with the Association if they intended to compete in any of the recognized sport meetings.

Girls not registered would not be permitted to compete in any competition sponsored by the athletic body.

Rival Managers Expect Series To Go Seven Games

Most Exciting World Series In History Is Predicted By Managers

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—There aren't many convictions about this coming World Series battle between the Senators and the Giants that Managers Bill Terry and Joe Cronin hold in common, but upon this one point they do agree.

The total absence of a genuine ball game busting wallop of the Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Al Simmons, Jimmy Foxx breed in either outfield levels the two teams off to such an extent that six games and possibly the full seven will be needed to decide this championship.

Seven Games?

"For the first time in many years," says Terry, "We don't have to worry about guys like Babe Ruth and Gehrig who win series all alone. All we've got to beat is a good ball team, not a couple of supermen. I expect it will take seven of the most exciting games in the history of the series."

Regretfully, though with full confidence in the pounding power of Heinie Manush, Fred Shulte, Leon "Goose" Goslin, and Sheriff Harris, Cronin agrees that there will be no need for dwellers in the streets beyond Gogan's buff to ball on the storm windows to save the property when the firing starts Tuesday in the Polo Grounds.
