March 3.—Private bills for session, as compared with last year. The total number of applications so far is 79, as compared with a total of 173 passed in 1903. The new applications include 10 new railway charters, 29 amendments to the railway incorporation acts, 13 new miscellaneous charters of incorporation and 12 amendments to existing acts. There are 9 divorce applications and one for extension of patent rights.

THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Annual Meeting Summerside Improvement and Tourist Association.

There was a good attendance at the annual meeting of the Summerside Improvement and Tourist Association last evening and much interest was taken in the large amount of business transacted.

The following is the address of the President, J. E. Lefurgey:—

Gentlemen:—On this the first anniversary of our organization we have reason to feel proud of the praiseworthy efforts put forth, and the excellent work done by the energetic members of our Association. Our labors have been entirely new to us, yet I think you will all agree we have accomplished much to be thankful for. Though occasional discouraging incidents confronted us, we have found the people in general, the Town Council and business men in particular, very courteous and willing to assist in our endeavors to further the best interests of the town.

This Association may well be credited largely with having at least prompted citizens to take more pride in their town and to see in a clearer light than ever before the advantages of holding out inducements to tourists by beautifying public and personal property, besides otherwise making our surroundings more attractive to strangers and more desirable for the residents. By our efforts the Public Square has been considerably improved; long-needed bathing houses have, through our influence, been erected; and other signs of progress are remarkably apparent.

But the greatest of all our undertakings are the preparatory work being made for a grand Reunion of Islanders and a Summer Carnival, details of which will be fully brought before you in the correspondence and the report of the Secretary. This great Home-coming, which will be accompanied by a large influx of strangers induced to visit here next July, promises much towards advertising our province as a tourist resort. It should, and no doubt will be strongly supported by our business men whose interests shall be greatly benefited thereby. A general program of sports etc to be given during the two weeks of the At Home is now nearly completed and will consist, as you are all quite aware, of daily events in which several of our societies are taking a part. In this connection there is a great amount of work ahead of us, and I would urge that all the support possible be given the officers in charge of the arrangements. I would suggest that the incoming Secretary, whose duties will be arduous during the coming year, be paid a liberal salary.

I would also make the following suggestions:— That the Town Council be approached for financial assistance in carrying out our work; be also requested to erect a band-stand and to engage one of our brass bands to give at least weekly concerts on the Public Square during the summer months.

That this Association strongly agitate the matter of opening Summer street to Water street.

That the Association urge upon the railway authorities the necessity of engaging a policeman during the summer months at Summerside railway station and railway wharf; and to have the east and west bound trains placarded designating their destination.

That an effort be made to obtain all information possible as to hotel and boarding-house accommodation in Summerside and vicinity, and a record of same kept for the benefit of tourists and others who may desire such information.

That an appeal be made to the provincial Government for a grant toward the support of a Tourist Bureau for Summerside.

On these few suggestions, and any other matters that I may have overlooked and which may appeal to the members of this Association, I beg your careful consideration.

Trusting that my successor in office may have the same cordial support it was my pleasure to receive at your hands, I close by thanking you all for the kind assistance rendered in behalf of myself and the other officers in carrying on our noble and patriotic work.

The matter of approaching the Town Council re the suggestion in the President's report was referred to the Town Improvement Committee.

A resolution was passed urging upon the railway authorities to appoint a policeman at the railway station and to have the trains placarded.

The Tourist Committee and Secretary were instructed to obtain information re hotel accommodation.

The executive committee was authorized to appeal to the Provincial Legislature for a grant towards the support of a Tourist Bureau.

A yearly salary of \$50 was voted to the Secretary.

The Secretary was authorized to write the Plant S. S. Company asking them to have their steamer call at Summerside. A resolution was passed to be forwarded.
