STUMP BURNER

Bell Shaped Cover With Smoke Outlet Surrounds Stump

For the swift and cleanly extermination of tree stumps the apparatus shown here seems to fill the bill. A bell-shaped metal cover surrounds the stump and around the top of this cover are openings, through which is thrust the burner tube. One opening has a pipe, or smokestack, rising from it, and this carries off the smoke

that accumulates under the bell. At the point of the burner tube is a lighting coil that has a tip close to the mouth of the tube. As the gas is forced through the tube it can be automatically lighted from the outside by turning the key that operates the coil. This gives a powerful, roaring flame of intense heat that consumes the stump in short order, the noxious fumes escaping through the smoke stack, which carries them over the workman's head.

NOW MAKING GOOD

Young Englishman Who Wrote Poetry in Prison Justifies His Release

"John Carter," the young English convict who was released from the Minnesota State prison about three years ago because his ability as a poet had won the friendship of influential men, is said to have fully justified the confidence reposed in him and has "made good" in the world beyond the prison walls. Carter is not the real name of the young man who became an international figure because of the appeal made in his behalf by Robert Underwood Johnson, editor of the Century, and others distinguished in the world of letters. He was born in England, of good family, about twenty-seven years ago. At the age of nineteen he went to Canada, and made his way to Winnipeg. Inexperienced and frail, he was unable to obtain employment. It was while attempting to beat his way from Winnipeg to St. Paul that he was put off a train at Karlstad, Minn. Cold and almost starved, he broke into the railroad station and stole \$24 and a watch. He was sentenced to prison for ten years, and there, "to kill time and ease my unhappy thoughts," he began writing poems that won the admiration and praise of Mr. Johnson and other editors. Through their influence he was released from prison on his twenty-fourth birthday, and began life anew under more favorable circumstances.
