—The latest news, first of all.

—Mrs. Andrew Reid, Summerside, who has been ill is improving in health.

—The Rev. H. R. Bell, will preach in New Glasgow tomorrow at 11 g. m. and seven p. m.

—The Alberton market prices are as follows:—Pork 8 cts per lb, eggs 15 cts. per doz, potatoes 30 cts. per bushel, butter 16 cts per lb, hay \$8 per ton and white and black oats, 40 cents per bus.

—Dealers in Summerside yesterday were paying 16 to 17c per lb for butter, 15 cents per doz for eggs, \$8 to \$9 per ton for hay, \$4.50 for straw, 8 to 8 1/2c per lb for pork, 50 for white seed oats and 50 for black.

—J. F. Lafferty, The Guardian's efficient representative at Summerside, has found it necessary to resign that position owing to the increase in his father's business with which he is actively associated. Applicants for the position should write Manager Guardian, Charlottetown. 4-28drtf.

—Among the passengers by the Empress to Summerside last evening were, His Lordship Bishop McDonald returning from Quebec; Supt. Sharpe, returning from Moncton; Frederick Houle and bride, Charlottetown returning from their wedding trip and John T. McNally, Summerside returning from a visit to his son in the western states.

—The Free Act Comedy, All tangled up, was presented by the Lafferty Dramatic Club of Summerside before a large audience in the Market Hall last night. All the different members of the cast carried out their parts in excellent form. Between the acts, Professor Vimicombe, accompanied by Miss Durant on the piano, gave several excellent violin selections. A comedy song by James Kennedy, was also good, and to which he had to respond to a hearty encore.

—The Colonial Stock Company which opens in Summerside on Thursday of next week is one of the best companies that has visited the Province for some time and has met with splendid success in the several places they have a fine repertoire, elegant costumes, while their stage scenery is first class and acting is cleverly done by artists. The plays are sprightly, with a fine moral to each and the more objectionable is given in any way so that they are suitable to all classes. The vaudeville is also of a high order.

—A special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade, called for the purpose of receiving reports of the delegates to Ottawa, was held in the Council Chamber on Thursday night. A communication from the secretary of Maritime Board was read, giving the usual notice of the annual meeting and asking for subjects to be laid over till the next meeting. The report of the delegates was next in the following questions, first, supply the Railway at Summerside with some water from the town system second alterations in the Summerside Post Office building. The building of the Armory, fourth, steamboat service between Montreal and Newfoundland, with Summerside as a port of call, fifth water communication with the mainland. On the first subject they in company with Premier Haszard and J. W. Richards, M. P. interviewed Deputy Minister Butler of the Railway Dept. and submitted to him the figures which the town is prepared to furnish water and the advantage to the Railway over its present system. Mr. Butler assured the committee that their proposition would be recommended to the Minister. Alterations to the Post Office, they were assured, would be recommended and would be undertaken next summer. In regard to the matter of the building of an armory at Summerside Sir Frederick Borden gave them his promise that at the next session of Parliament he would recommend an appropriation for this purpose and work will be commenced on the building next summer. In the matter of the steamship service, to Newfoundland, the Black Diamond line were now receiving a subsidy of \$7,000 a year for calling at two island ports, Charlottetown and Souris, the latter port had never called at, the contract will however stand for this year, but when renewed would include Summerside. However, a further effort will be made to have Summerside included this season as well. On the question of communication it had been decided by the department that the arrival of the Earl Grey one of the present steamers would be employed in the light house service on the Bay of Fundy. A solid island delegation, consisting of Premier Haszard, A. B. Warburton, J. W. Richards, A. F. Fraser, and L. E. Prowse M. P's. Hon's Senator Yeo and William Richards, Joseph Read and William Stewart, with E. M. McDonald, M. P. of Pictou, unanimously insisted upon placing one of the winter steamers on the Western route. After a lengthy discussion it was finally arranged that the Stanley would remain on the western route as long as the Earl Grey and Minto remained on the Charlottetown route, after which the Minto and Stanley would go to the Bay of Fundy. A. C. Saunders commended the work of the delegates and moved a vote of thanks to them for their excellent work which was seconded by H. A. Comp-ton and carried unanimously.
