NORTH GRAFTON, Feb. 28.—This town was shocked last night at the sudden death of Miss Mary Emily Reid, High Street, in Memorial Hospital, Worcester.

MEDICAL SCIENCE DEALS WITH VENEREAL DISEASES

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—Between two and three years study is represented in a new publication dealing with the diagnosis and treatment of venereal diseases, which is being issued by the federal department of health and will be sent to every doctor in the Dominion.

Women Will Occupy Seat In Red Chamber Some Day MONTREAL, Feb. 28.—A prediction that a woman would some day occupy a seat in the Senate was made today by Hon. R. T. Bennett, Leader of the Conservative party, when he addressed the members of the Women's Canadian Club.

To "Outlaw" War

(Special to the Guardian) PARIS, Feb. 28.—Foreign Minister Briand today declared the latest note on "outlawing war," sent by Frank B. Kellogg, United States Secretary of State, as "a great step forward," after a cabinet meeting at which the note was discussed. The note is understood to be extremely friendly in tone and probably will be made public simultaneously in Paris and Washington tomorrow.

The summary of the note, which Ambassador Claudel cabled to Paris indicated, however, that France and the United States still differ on the characterization of war to be outlawed and on the method used. Washington is felt in French circles to hold the view that a pact between the two countries to outlaw war becomes extremely difficult when an effort is made to make it general.
