Describes Work of
T. B. League
Bill Currie was chairman of the
regular meeting of the Summerside
Y's Men's Club held on Thursday
evening in the Olympia and
Archie Hopkins was fines master.

Major Hudson, executive secretary
of the Tuberculosis League
was the guest speaker. He gave a
very interesting talk on the work
of the League and told the meeting
that almost 10,000 people have
been X-rayed this summer.

The general attitude of the people
is, he said, that after the age
of 21 one need not worry about
tuberculosis which actually is a
dangerous age is between 25 and
40. Most of the patients in the
Sanatorium are in this age group,
he said. X-ray must be a regular
procedure.

Thirty-three new and unsuspected
cases were found in the rural
areas this summer, many of whom
can be cured at home without
interference with their work. In the
two weeks in which the unit has
been in Summerside 12,075 persons
have been X-rayed. Some six
suspected cases have been found. He
stressed that until everyone is X-
rayed regularly tuberculosis cannot
be eradicated.

Major Hudson then told of the
plans for the annual tuberculosis
unit sale campaign. The dates for
the canvass of business houses
are November 21 and 22-and the
objective is \$5000. H. T. Holman,
is the chairman of the committee
of the club in charge of the
campaign.-S.

THE STRATTON STORY
AT CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE

The gallant story of one of
the most courageous figures in the
world of sport is unfolded on the
Capitol screen in "The Stratton
Story." M-G-M's new film based
on the spectacular and dramatic
career of Monty Stratton, who
came from the sandlots of Texas
to win fame as a pitching star
with the Chicago White Sox.

While backgrounded with the
thrills of big league ball park
scenes, the sports angle of the nar-
rative is subservient to the true-
to-life story of Monty Stratton
who, after two seasons that put
him on the verge of all-time
greatness, suffered a hunting acci-
dent that caused the amputation
of his right leg. How he came
back, eight years later to resume
a pitching career in the game he
loved and to be named the "Most
Courageous Athlete of the Year"
in 1946, makes for a story that
will leave few onlookers untouched.

with naturalness, warmth and a
