AN UP-TO-DATE FACTORY.
 Pure Gold Manufacturing Co., Erecting
 Premises in Toronto.

Mr. A. F. Wickson, the architect, is at present busy erecting a building on the corner of King and Duncan streets, for the Pure Gold Manufacturing Co. The structure will have a frontage on King street of 60 feet, and on Duncan of 185 feet 6 inches, to Pearl street, which is to be extended out to John street. There will be an area of 6480 square feet, exclusive of the boiler house, which will be a separate building. There will be four storeys and basement, and the whole will be finished, externally, with Don Valley pressed brick.
 The entrance will be through a handsome portico, in pressed brick and stone columns, covering the external flight of stone steps.
 The private rooms of the president and managing director, also the main offices, will be on the first floor, facing King street, and will be more artistically finished with high wainscoting, beam ceiling and handsome screens.
 There will be a private testing room, or laboratory which will be used, as may be readily surmised, for trials of the company's products from time to time; also for demonstration before classes of the various cooking schools of Toronto, which will be invited to participate in these interesting experiments. The Pure Gold Company all along felt that it was to the interest of the community that there should be the utmost freedom and clearest understanding between the public and themselves as to what goes into their products, and their method of preparation; hence, the idea of a public demonstration there from time to time, which is to be aimed at.
 The manufacturing portion of the building is, of course, in the rear of the main offices, and the mill rooms are all isolated by means of a solid brick fire wall

which runs from the basement right to the roof.
 It is interesting to note, in connection with the building, that a good deal of ingenuity and originality has had to be exercised because of the fact that nowhere can a building be found that has been erected for such a purpose.
 There are, of course, spice mills without number, also baking powder mills, but a complete factory for the manufacture of the Pure Gold line of grocery specialties, which has been built for the purpose, cannot be found, and so much care has been necessary in order to reach the very best results. What has been aimed at particularly, has been good light, clearly defined departmental management and thorough cleanliness.
 A splendid lunchroom has been provided for the employees, where the company propose to provide gratis, clean table linen, cutlery, crockery and tea and coffee so that each employe will simply have to provide his or her lunch, and will find on the company's part a splendid place in which to enjoy it.
 It goes without saying that dressing rooms also have been provided, each employe having a locker for him or her self also all the conveniences necessary for an up to date concern.
 Above all, what has been recognized is that, in the manufacturing of these food products, the actual freedom from contact in flavor, as between the different items, is necessary to preserve the purity of the goods, and the Pure Gold Company will feel satisfied, if when they get started in this new place, they have reached this standard of attainment at all events, so that where a highly flavored product is produced, it doesn't necessarily follow that something else produced in the same factory, of an entirely different character should partake of the flavor not intended for it.

FORESTS OF THE WORLD.

LONDON, November 27.—The daily Mail publishes the following: The news that Russia is at last about to manage her almost illimitable forests on a scientific plan and more vigorously complete for Great Britain's trade in timber draws attention to the threatened shortage in the world's supply of wood.
 For the past five years Great Britain has spent on the average of £32,000,000 a year on timber. She has bought largely from countries whose supply is now falling off. Norway's output is decreasing; Austria's is decreasing; and even Canada's

apparently boundless resources have supplied Europe with less and less timber in the last few years. But the shortage in Europe alone amounted last year to 2,000,000 tons, and in Europe this is only likely to be wiped out by the increased supply from Sweden and Russia which scientific forestry would produce.
 Of the nations consuming timber Great Britain stands easily first, spending annually on the average £8,000,000 more than Germany, which comes second, and £19,000,000 more than France, which makes a bad third. The United States has recently made a great effort to cater for the world's need in this as well as in other respects, but owing to her vast plains and prairies the United States cannot continue to export timber.
 The experts in forestry, however, declare that the British Empire could easily grow its own supply if scientific forestry and rational management were introduced throughout the empire. It was stated on Saturday by an Indian forest officer that if the magnificent timber resources of Canada were controlled by a system as thorough as that established in India the Dominion could easily supply the Mother country with 3,000,000 tons of timber a year.
 "Why cannot such a system be started?" queried this officer. "And why let Russia and all the rest in, when our own Colonies can supply our needs and, in doing so, enrich themselves?"

the fact, but how is something of a mystery. We know that Moses was worthy of this call, for he made the prompt response, "Here am I," for service or to do thy bidding. "Put off thy shoes"—The Orientals were wont to leave their sandals at the door of a house or temple so as not to carry off any dirt. So the command to remove the shoes was plain to Moses, for "the place" was now "holy."
 6. "I am the God thy Father"—Allusion is here made to the covenant made to the ancestors of Moses, which was still binding and would be fully carried out. Jehovah is a covenant-keeping God, for truth dwells for ever with him. "Hid his face"—In humility and also in fear, for it was thought that no one could look upon the face of God and live.
 7. "I have surely seen"—The eye of God is in every place, though we may forget, and he watches over his oppressed people and will save them. God saw the sorrow of those Hebrew slaves in Egypt; he heard their cry for deliverance, and he the conduct of their oppressors. He sees

and hears for a purpose; first to bring his enslaved people out of Egypt; and second, to bring them into Canaan. The land of promise was before the Jews, with God as their true leader, though Moses was the human one. The land of promise was a good land and fertile as is the idea of the phrase "flowing with milk and honey."
 10. "I will send thee"—Here was the call to Moses and the effect of it upon him and upon the nation, and, through the nation, on the world, no mind of man can calculate. How poor the world would be if Moses had not done his work, and the Jews had been to this day slaves in Egypt. To this ancient people we owe such thoughts of God and holiness of as will never die out. Moses went forth from that place with a message to Pharaoh and to his people.
 11, 12. "Who am I?"—A question asked in the depths of humility, even as Paul in later years asked, "Whom sufficient for these things?" The talk was so great and Moses in the presence of God felt as

never before, how weak he was; and yet he was, of all Israel, the best fitted to be a leader. With the command, Go, came the promise, "I will be with thee, and with that came courage. "Upon this mountain"—The bush was probably on Mount Sinai, one of the peaks of the Horeb range, and on which Jehovah afterward came down in fire.

STORMS ON THE VOYAGE.
 All the ships of the fleet, including the flagship, met with terrific weather on the way to Bermuda from Halifax, says a despatch. The Psyche was two days overdue and the Crescent was under orders to proceed in search of her when she arrived. Several of the vessels suffered deck damage and lost boats. The Crescent will leave Bermuda January 2nd on her cruise south and will return to Bermuda March 15th. The Blake will be due at Bermuda early in April to relieve the Crescent.—Halifax Herald.
