Bavarian Woman Writes Of War Torn Europe

The following is a letter received from Fran Helmi Stock of Bavaria by the President of the P. E. I. Diocesan Board of the Women's Auxiliary of the Church of England in Canada.

Contacts have been made with these women through a visit last summer by Mrs. Carrington, wife of the Archbishop of Puckee and Auxiliary Secretary on the W. A. Dominion Board. These contacts have been followed up by the various Diocesan Presidents in Canada working through the Dominion Board.

Frien, 1 February 1949.

Dear Mrs. Cosh:

In the beginning of February I received your kind letter, you had written me in the beginning of October. So it had taken a long time for its far journey, and you perhaps will be thinking that you will never receive an answer any more. Therefore I will write to you at once to thank you above all very heartily for your letter, in which you seek contact with me and our mothers' circle. As it is a long time, since I learned English at school and my knowledge of this language was never very great, I was all the more pleased to be able to read your letter quite easily and so could learn something of your life.

Now I should also like to tell you something of myself, and then, above all, of our parish and our mothers' circle. My name is Helmi Stock and I was born in an evangelical Rectory, my father still is being a clergyman in Munich. I am 31 year old. I married nine years ago at the beginning of the war. My husband was a clergyman here in Frien. I could live and work with him only for a short time. In spring 1941 he was enlisted as a soldier and like most men he had to leave his beloved work for the hard task of war. These days it will be just five years that he was home for the last time, since he is missing. The war brought me and my family further deep grief. In an air raid my parents lost all their belongings and my youngest sister her life. So we have gone through sad trouble, and when I look back on these sad years, I often wonder how we bore it, and I can only owe it to God's faithful guidance and aid, that has helped us through everything up to-day. I am very happy to have been able to remain here in Frien with my three children (aged 4-7 years), and in the parish with which I am truly united so that I can also go on presiding over mothers' circle, and that is a beautiful, if often difficult task.

5,000 Inhabitants

Frien is a small place of about 5000 inhabitants. If you should wish to look it up on the map, you must go about 90 km. to the southeast of Munich, capital of Bavaria, where you soon will find the Chiemsee, and that is where we are at home. It is a beautiful country in which we live, the lake and the mountains lending it its special feature, and during the years I have spent in it I have grown to love it very much. If one has seen the destroy work in all their desolence and horror, one can realize what it means, to be able to live intact and lovely surroundings.

Our evangelical parish here is a Dispersion Community, that means, that we Protestants form a minority in a Roman Catholic country. Where even the smallest village naturally has its Catholic church in which the Divine Service is regularly celebrated, the Protestants often have to come from afar, and sometimes under the most difficult circumstances, to be able to attend Divine Service and Parish life. My husband and I had to be almost continually on the road to gather the parishioners, that live dispersed all over the countryside, and to bring them the word of our Lord and his Divine consolations. Although this is most certainly difficult it also has a beauty of its own: the bond of the belief that unite us are much firmer and truer than if everything were quite natural and matter-of-course, and one comes to know many true fidelity, that is a help and a comfort to oneself; for instance, when a woman who has to walk two hours here and two hours back home, not only attends regularly (although she has a lot of work at home), but even begs us to hold our meetings more often, one experiences a deep wonder and is both ashamed and happy.

Through the events of the war and even more past war, many alien existences forcibly have entered here. As our Bavaria, with exception of the cities was relatively spared the effects of the

Unemployment Official Dies

MONCTON, N. B., June 15—(CP)—Robert W. Goss, well-known unemployment insurance official and former resident of Halifax died here today at his home. He was 58.

An employee of the Unemployment Insurance Commission since its inception in 1940 he had been at regional headquarters here since 1946 as employment advisor on construction, transportation and public utilities.

He was born in Woodstock, N. B., in 1891, only son of Mrs. A. Merritt and the late Mr. Goss. As a young man he was employed with the Canadian National Express until the outbreak of the First World War. He enlisted in and served overseas with the 36th Battery.

After his discharge he was employed with the Nova Scotia Government for some time. He joined the U.I.C. when it was organized and was manager of the Halifax Employment Office before his transfer to Moncton.

war, many people sought refuge here already during the war. And when the great stream of fugitives from the east set in after the war, it brought us a multitude of homeless persons. This meant a sudden rush of tasks and difficulties, with which we, as a Christian community, still have to cope to-day. There is a great misery and bitter poverty, that have grown worse since the monetary reform last year, there is the threatening unemployment, and the scarcity of lodgings is still an unsolvable problem. With a grateful heart I should like to tell you, that through the American gifts, offered us by the Protestant Relief Society, we have been able to render much help in form of clothing and food since 1945. Your love has often filled our hands so that we need not stand with them empty, when the multitude of begging brethren came streaming into the Rectory, and I am happy to have found this occasion to personally offer you our thanks.

Perhaps even worse than the bodily needs are the sufferings of the soul, especially of our women. Even it is hardly ever uttered, you can see it in many faces, that they can't get any longer and that all hope and belief is at an end. Out of all this suffering our mothers circle was born. We felt, that we dare not leave these women alone with their burdens that were much too heavy for them. We felt that we had to gather them in a community to seek the path of Jesus Christ, our Lord and together, the only true Helper in all trouble and grief. And that this path is a good and a lovely and a happy one, we have experienced over and over again.

For as now as we start out on this path, we feel that Christ our Lord comes to meet us in the midst of our tribulations and helps us bear them. I should like much I should like to tell you concerning the lives of the mothers of our circle, and if you should wish to hear it, I will tell you in my next letter. I should also be glad to give you a more detailed receipt of the nature of our gatherings and biblework. We would be very much interested to know in which manner you work with your women and what kind of questions and troubles cause you the most difficulties (as surely you also have troubles and tribulations in Canada and the U. S. A. although we look upon it as a fairyland). Oh, it is really too wonderful and it makes me feel so happy, to know, that we wish to seek and find one another as Christians across all frontiers and separations. What a privilege it grants us over all politics! Please God, that in this way we may be of a little help in the rebuilding of the world's peace!
