THE CITY COUNCIL.

In view of the undoubted irregularities
connected with the recent election of
Mayor and Councillors in this city, The
Guardian learns that some members of
the Council have conferred together in re-
gard to the steps necessary to render their
election valid. We think they will find
it advisable to have the election con-
firmed by an act of the Legislature.

While in the way of putting things
right it would be well to have the civic
charter so amended as to render ineligible
for the office of Councillor any person
who has been convicted of violation of
any public statute within a stated time,
say one year previous. There ought also
to be an amendment to Section 5 to dis-
qualify any member of the Council
who does not attend the
meetings of that body. Some persons
are apparently under the impression that
non-attendance is now a disqualifying
offence, but such is not the case. To
make this clear we quote Section 5 in
full:

5. If any person holding the office of
Mayor or Councillor shall be declared
bankrupt, or make an assignment for the
benefit of creditors or otherwise dispose
of all his property or shall apply to take
the benefit of any act for the relief of in-
solvent debtors, or shall have any interest
by himself or partner in contract or em-
ployment with or on behalf of the City
Council, shall compound by deed with his
creditors, or shall be absent from the
said city more than three calendar
months at one and the same time, without
being authorized by a resolution of the
City Council entered upon its minutes,
unless in case of illness, then and in every
such case such person shall immediately
become disqualified and shall cease to
hold the office of Mayor or Councillor as
aforesaid.

Such is the disqualifying section of the

Act and it will be seen that while absence
for three months from the city without
leave will vacate a Councillor's seat non-
attendance at the meetings of Council
however long such non-attendance may
last is in no way punishable. This ought
not so to remain. As the law now stands
there is no penalty for the non-attendance
of any or all the City Councillors at the
meetings of the Council. The need of an
amendment to cover this obvious defect
in the law must be apparent to all.

It is sufficiently obvious also that any
Councillor who for a prolonged period
neglects or refuses to attend the regular
meetings of the Council does so in viola-
tion of the last clause of his oath of office
which reads as follows:

"And I do swear that I will diligently,
faithfully and impartially and to the best
of my ability discharge the several duties
which appertain to the said office of Coun-
cillor while I hold the same. So Help me
God." A Councillor who has taken the
above oath is bound by all that honest
men hold sacred, and by all that can bind
a man of honor, to attend the meetings of
Council. But if both the obligations of
law and the sanctity of an oath are dis-
regarded, then it becomes clearly the duty
of the Legislature to provide a sure and
effective remedy in disqualification.

and then why the decrease? Because we
have relaxed our efforts before we have
reached the height of our perfection.

On motion of Rev. A. E. Burke seconded
by James M. McLeod the motion was
received and considered section by sec-
tion.

Speaking of inspection, Father Burke
said the government should give further
aid.

In answer to a request for a statement
from Mr. Morrow he said the work was
rather too much for one man since the in-
creased number of factories. The work
was more than one man could profitably
attend to.

Father Burke suggested that informa-
tion be obtained as to the milk supply
from cows and it was agreed to extend
the Inspector's ledger as to include this
information.

The bad reports from some of our cheese
at the English market, was discussed by
Father Burke, A. J. Biffin, Lauehlin Mc-
Donald, John Anderson and others and
the opinion was general that the trouble
was owing to the transportation facilities
to the Old Country. Inspector Morrow
then submitted his report as follows.
