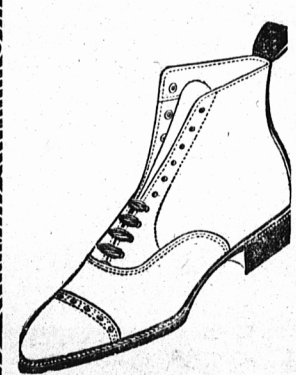

Operations In Macedonia

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, Sept. 26—The operations in Macedonia the War Office tonight says: Between the River Struma and the River Vardar there has been artillery fighting and fairly spirited shelling, particularly along the British front in the region of Doiran Lake. There have been no infantry engagements on the Serbian front. French artillery has vigorously shelled Bulgarian positions on the right bank of the Broda. East of Florina troops were subjected to violent counter attacks by important Bulgarian forces in front of Armentières, and have resisted brilliantly, all assaults of the enemy. Mowed down by our artillery and the fire of our infantry the attackers suffered heavy losses.

West of Florina Russian troops in conjunction with French troops delivered spirited engagements to the north of Armentières, during the course of which they took five hundred prisoners and captured fifty-four machine guns.

S.—Mr. Peter McGilvray left for Rumford Falls, Me., last week.—Mrs. James Cavanagh, sr., who has been visiting in Rollo Bay, has returned home.—The sheep census of the district recently completed shows the total number of sheep and lambs to be one hundred and eighty-seven, of which number Mr. Donnick Bowen, the noted sheep raiser, has seventy-three. The farmers of the district following Mr. Bowen's example, are going more largely into sheep raising, which they find is a profitable business.—Miss Mollie O'Donnell of Rollo Bay was a visitor to Glenfanning last week. Mr. William McLeod of Martvale, egg collector, is obtaining large quantities of eggs for which he pays a good price.—Harvesting is completed, and already a good deal of ploughing has been done.—Miss Gerlie Smith, of the Queen Hotel, Charlottetown, paid a brief visit to Glenfanning last week.

\*PRISONERS KILLED By Aero Bombs (Special to the Guardian.) BUCHAREST, Sept. 27—Sixty prisoners were killed and a large number wounded in Bucharest Monday afternoon by a bomb dropped from a Zeppelin of aeroplanes and five others were killed Monday night by bombs dropped on the city from a Zeppelin, according to an official statement issued today. Two-thirds of the victims are declared to be women and children.

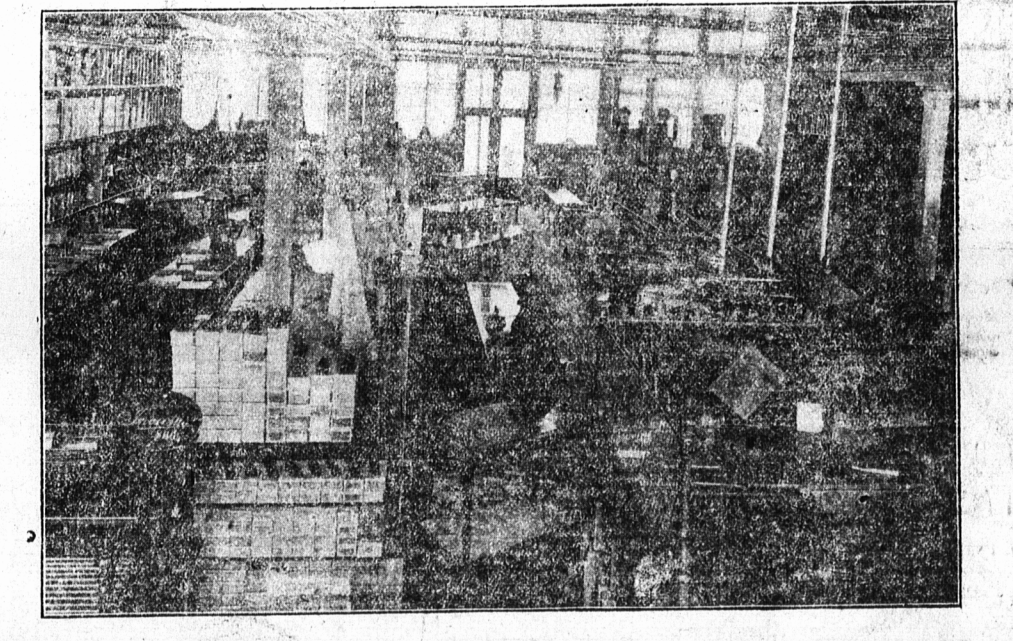
\*PRETTY WEDDING AT MONTAGUE—On Wednesday, September 27th at high noon there took place at Montague the marriage of two of the most popular young people of that town Miss Katie M. The handsome and costly presents which Mr. and Mrs. Murdoch received were a tangible token of the high esteem in which they are both held in their community. The groom is a member of the firm of Ives & Murdoch, of Montague, while the bride had been conducting a millinery establishment for some time. They have both a large circle of friends.

\*WOMEN AND CHILDREN KILLED. No military building was hit but sixty prisoners were killed and a large number wounded by bombs falling on a sanitarium and an orphanage. Two-thirds of the victims were women and children. On the night of the 25th a Zeppelin dropped bombs on Bucharest, killing five children. Our aircraft have bombed camps in Transylvania.
