Recreation Center To Open Today

HALIFAX, July 31.—(CP)—The Navy League's new Recreation Centre opens tomorrow with a 12-hour program that has brought to Halifax such varied personalities as Navy Minister Macdonald and Babe Ruth.

Something new in the way of entertaining men of Canada's armed services during their spare time, the Navy League Recreation Centre is a prosaic name indeed for 12 green acres in the centre of Halifax where sailors soldiers and airmen can play a score of outdoor games ranging from lawn bowling to rugby.

At an estimated cost of \$60,000, the Navy League has renovated the historic and beautiful grounds of the Wanderers Amateur Athletic Club, providing clubhouses and camp-teens, showers and lockers so that the men of the Dominion and Allied Nations can find plenty of healthful exercise in their hours of leisure.

Tomorrow's opening is dedicated to the purpose of the club. Main event will be a monster track and field meet—the Maritime inter-service track and field meet—with teams representing the navy, army and Canadian and British air forces in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Ray Robinson Outpoints Sammy Angott

NEW YORK, July 31.—(AP)—Ray Robinson kept his amazing winning streak intact tonight, but only after coming from far back to win a 10-round decision from lightweight champion Sammy Angott in Madison Square Garden.

Piling the 122nd straight triumph on his unbeaten record as an amateur and a pro, the skinny Harlem Hammer, who is regarded as some of the best fighters in the world, outpointed the "uncrowned" welterweight champion, spotted Sammy three of the first four rounds, then turned loose his startling speed and explosive power to take the verdict.

For most of the way, a good crowd stood and roared at the blows as the "uncrowned" welterweight in the eighth round, both fighters were on the floor, each for an eight count.
