A MOVE is now being made to have a daily mail for Cavendish and Bay View, to be carried from Stanley Bridge P. O. which will then become a distributing office. The distance from Stanley Bridge via Bay View to Cavendish is only five and a half miles. So the cost of carrying the mail will not be heavy. This important section has long felt the need of a daily mail service, as there are many daily papers going to these offices, and also a large number of letters. People there have to drive all the way to Stanley Bridge, in order to have important letters answered with despatch. The GUARDIAN trusts the P. O. Department will speedily arrange the matter, and earn the gratitude of this progressive section of country.

A NUMBER of ladies met at the Queen Hotel yesterday afternoon to consider the advisability of forming a local branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society. Mrs. C. C. Gardiner, on whose invitation they had met, explained briefly the purpose and methods of the Society. A temporary organization was effected with Mrs. Gardiner as President, Mrs. McCready and Miss Esid McLean as Secretaries. It is contemplated to have a Secretary for each county. An effort will be made to secure a room where future meetings can be held and the work of the society carried on. When this is done a more permanent organization will be effected. The immediate object of the movement is to obtain and forward requisites for sick and wounded soldiers from Prince Edward Island now at the front. It is hoped to send the supplies with the ship which carries the second contingent leaving Halifax on January 15, so that time is very short. Further announcements will be made as the work proceeds.

THE Rev. Major MacIntosh preached an eloquent and exceedingly practical New Years sermon on Sunday the 31st. His text was "Choose ye this day whom you will serve," Joshua 24-15. THE schr. Clara Jane, Clarke, has left Georgetown for Sydney. She has been loaded by W. A. Poole & Co. with 1000 bus. potatoes, 155 bus. oats, 135 bus. turnips, 15 carcasses pork, 8 carcasses beef, 3 carcasses mutton and a quantity of vegetables, hay, straw, poultry, &c. Later. At half past five Monday evening during the exciting storm the Clara Jane went ashore at Poverty Beach, near Johnson's Factory, Murray Harbor North. The schr. left Georgetown at daylight Monday morning. As the wind was very light she only reached Cape George at 3 o'clock. The captain then noticing a change of weather, put back to Georgetown, but a blinding snowstorm overtook him and caused the disaster. Had he gone about a mile and a half further south he would have reached shelter at Murray Harbor. The captain telephoned the owner of the cargo stating that he did not know the condition of the vessel and cargo, but as she had struck on a sandy bottom she was probably uninjured and her deck load intact. The cargo will have to be removed before the schr. can be got off.—Pat.
