Hockey Moguls Called to Meet

NEW YORK, Mar. 12.—Frank Calder, President of the National Hockey League, issued a call for a special meeting here on Monday morning, at which arrangements will be made for the Stanley Cup play-offs, and later the series which will decide the world's championship in professional hockey. At the meeting also the representatives will discuss certain rules changes calculated to speed up the game, the main idea being to conform some what more to the code that obtained in the defunct Coast League.

It is also said that applications for at least two additional franchises will be made—one for Cleveland and another for a second club in Chicago.

There is gossip that the National League is likely greatly to expand before another year. It is even intimated enough clubs may be taken in so that the present group may split into two major leagues in the interests of Stanley Cup championship play.
