GERMANS SINK STEAMER MARNA

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, July 1.—The Norwegian steamer Marna, of Mandal, Norway, bound for Leith with a cargo of pit props, has been sunk by a German submarine off Halsund. The Marna was 14 tons gross and 210 feet long. The British barque Thistle Bank, which sailed from Bahia Blanca, Argentina, on April 26th with a cargo of wheat for Queenstown, was torpedoed by a German submarine yesterday at a point off Fastnet, Ireland. Some of the crew were landed at Baltimore, a small seaport, 47 miles southwest of Cork.
