NEW YORK, July 17.—(AP)—Cleveland Indians climbed into first place in the American League today by the inspiring process of losing 4-3 in the sixth-inning to New York Yankees.

Detroit Tigers, of course co-operated by losing both ends of a double-header at Boston, and fell back to a tie with the Red Sox for second place.

The struggle at Yankee Stadium, sparsely populated by 16,084 fans, might have been a magnificent pitching battle between rapid Robert Feller and Marcellus Monte Pearson, a couple of no-hit heroes, on their best days.

But the contest went into overtime, finally ending when Red Rolie and Bill Dickey wrapped two singles around a sacrifice in the 13th for the deciding run.

In the sixth-inning, Trosky blasted his 18th circuit blow.

Erratic Eric McNair, Chicago third baseman, helped the Senators to their fourth straight victory at Washington by committing four errors and tying a 1-0 American League mark for misplays in a single game.

The Nats won 5-2.

Wins In Straight Heats Over Barney Hanover And Jane Azoff At Kensington

Aaron L., owned by McNeill and Melsaac of Charlottetown yesterday provided the most stunning upset of a day of upsets as he walked off with the Free For All at the Kensington Races in straight heats over the favored Jane Azoff. Best time of the three heats was 2:10 in the last mile but in winning the Charlottetown horse yesterday proved his superiority. It was his day and driver Joe O'Brien won just as he mile Driver Kelly tried in vain to snatch the pole. The Azoff mare was 3 3/2 Barney Hanover beating her out for runner-up position in the first two heats.

In the free for all trot Dude Potempkin showed a 1 1/4 summary to head the trotters, the 2:20 Trot & Pace was won by another Summerville horse, Major Bows in an extra heat race with Uscita Britton and Alestra while in the final race on the program Jimmy Power drove Darkey Kalmuck to an upset victory capturing the first and third heats after finishing seventh in the second due mainly to a bad start.

Major Bows showed his gameness by coming out and taking the third heat and winning his race in the extra heat.

Although times were not exceptionally fast nevertheless the horse followers present saw some spirited and exciting races. As said before Aaron L. had things much his own way in the Free For All race but in the other classes neck and neck finishes were the order of every heat with Heatherbele being the crowd an extra thrill in the second heat of the Free For All when after grabbing the pole on the first turn the 15-year-old trotter led the field right to the wire only to be beaten by a nose as Squire Hanover's closing rush just nipped the grand old campaigner.

Free For All Trot

First Heat: They got away on the first start with Squire Hanover at the rail Well back leaving the wire Heatherbele trotted around the field to be second at the first half to the Hanover crowd with Millie Kalmuck, June Evans and Dude Potempkin following in that order. They didn't change right to the 3-4 pole but here all the horses started their drive. As they neared the wire a blanket could have covered Jane Evans, Millie Kalmuck and Dude Potempkin but it was the Dude that got his nose under first with Hanover fourth and Heatherbele fifth.

Second Heat: Millie Kalmuck got away in front in the second heat. Heatherbele coming last raced to the pole on the second turn and opened up a big lead as he trotted past the stand for the first trip around. Going up the back stretch the field set out in chase of the flying Heatherbele. As they came into the stretch Squire Hanover was at Heatherbele's wheel and from here on the wire it was a thrilling chase with the Hanover horse edging out Heatherbele by a nose. Millie Kalmuck was third with Dude Potempkin and June Evans finishing in that order.

Third Heat: Heatherbele again took the pole in the first turn to lead right to the half way mark but the old campaigner dropped back from there on; Squire Hanover grabbed the rail at the stand to lead coming into the stretch but here Dude Potempkin trotting beautifully and victim of a bad start came very fast to flash under the wire a length to the good.

Free For All Pace

First Heat: Jane Azoff was a big favorite as the three entries took the first heat in the first race. Aaron L. was on the pole with Barney Hanover second and Azoff third. From the outset Azoff tried in vain to grab the rail but could not head either Aaron L. or Barney and they finished in that order.

The next two heats were practically a repetition of the first. Aaron L. could not be headed and neither could Barney Hanover for the second heat. As drivers jockeyed for position, Alestra went away on the pole only to lose it to Uscita Britton on the upper turn. Just as Uscita Britton went to the front Major Bows in third position was seen to go down; round the turn last and without a chance to pull out Bebe McElwyn

went right over the Bows horse with Driver O'Brien being thrown high in the air. Uscita Britton continuing to hold the lead finished the heat to win by two lengths. Neil Cochotadale being second. Alestra third and Major Bows fourth and fifth respectively.

Third Heat: Bebe McElwyn was drawn before the third heat got underway and with the drawback of a "stomach" in the second heat field was narrowed down to four starters. Uscita Britton led the entire first half followed by Neil Cochotadale and Major Bows. As they finished past the stand the Bows horse took the lead as a break to get past the stand. Britton horse went to a break that put him far behind the field. Major Bows continued in front making a game bid to head him in the stretch. Neil Cochotadale was third with Uscita Britton fourth.

Fourth Heat: Only the three heat winners, Alestra, Uscita Britton and Major Bows came out for the deciding mile. Major Bows went to the front right from the start and stayed there for the entire mile. Uscita Britton and Alestra were staging a battle for second place but the Britton horse was passed by Alestra just after completing the first round and wound up third.

2:28 Trot & Pace

First Heat: Nine horses came to the wire for the first heat and there was a lot of scoring before the field got the word. Darkey Kalmuck was on the pole but lost to June Henley on the second turn with Volo Scott third. The positions remained unchanged right to the top of the stretch the second time round and here Darkey Kalmuck brought the crowd to its feet as he finished very fast to flash past the stand a length in front. Jean Henley was second with Volo Scott third and the remainder of the field closely bunched.

Second Heat: With Fred Worthy and Golden Guy distanced in the first heat the field was narrowed down to seven for the second heat. Due to acting up on Scotty Watson's part it took a large number of minutes to get them away. When they did get the word Darkey Kalmuck was just recovering from break and was never a contender. Ethel Bellini trotting steadily all the way led the entire mile with the wire just the last lap. June Henley and Lucky Guy, who went a real good race finishing at Henley's wheel in third place.

Third Heat: Ethel Bellini was a-wire in front but went to a break right after the word that dropped her away back. Jean Henley took the lead followed by Scotty Watson, Little Aubrey and Darkey Kalmuck. The positions were unchanged as the field but as they came into the back stretch Darkey Kalmuck moved up rapidly from fourth place to take the lead from the Henley horse at the three-quarter mark and open up a commanding lead to win by a length and a half. Ethel Bellini who trotted a real mile after her disastrous break came fast—the last three quarters to finish in second place with Lucky Guy again going a good heat finishing third and Jean Henley fourth.

Armstrong Wins By Technical Knockout In 7th Over Lew Jenkins

By SID FEDER Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK July 17.—(AP)—Henry Armstrong floored Lew Jenkins six times between the fourth and sixth rounds tonight and defeated the lightweight champion via the technical knockout when the bell for the seventh round. Armstrong weighed 139; Jenkins 135 1/2. After taking all kinds of punishment himself for three rounds, the welterweight titleholder found the range in the fourth, floored the sixth round since the bell for the Texas thin man once in that heat—twice more in the fifth and three times in the sixth. Jenkins staggered to his corner at the end of the sixth, but couldn't come out again. He got off his stool and slumped to one knee in the corner, completely beaten. A crowd of about 20,000 turned out in cloudy weather for one of the greatest fights between little men in years. The State Athletic Commission officials gave an official ruling that the fight had ended in the sixth round since the bell for the seventh round had not sounded.

Detroit Tigers Lose Double-Header To Sox

BOSTON, July 17.—(AP)—Detroit Tigers should have "stood in bed" today. They not only lost a double header to Boston Red Sox, 8-3 and 8-5, which forced them to share second place in the American League with Boston, but they lost the services of Buck Newsom, their ace pitcher who had won 13 consecutive games for them. Newsom's thumb on his pitching hand was broken in two places when he caught a throw from Rudy York while dashing to cover first base on a grounder by Ted Williams in the fourth inning of the opener. Despite the injury, Newsom pitched to five more batters, retiring the side but giving up two runs in the process.
