THE BLACK DIAMOND SERVICE—There appears to be considerable doubt as to the probability of the Black Diamond Line continuing its service this year between Montreal and Newfoundland, calling at Charlottetown and Sydney, says the Sydney Record. It was stated in St. John some days ago that the service of the Old Colony would be suspended for the present and that the ships will be engaged, at least this season, conveying the products of the Sydney mines to British ports; also, it is said that another company are contemplating running steamers there from Montreal in the summer and from Boston in the winter time. Shipping is in a rather uncertain state just at present owing to the impossibility of judging what the requirements of the Admiralty will be during the summer and many changes are expected in the make up of the line. It is expected an announcement will be made in a few days.

Fisher fur is fairly valuable, the normal price of a pelt being between \$30 and \$40. Mr. Rombough has also in his ranch six pairs of mink besides a number of silver foxes.

SLEEPY HOLLOW NOW HAS MODERN RIP VAN WINKLE.

NEW YORK, March 26.—When Rip Van Winkle woke up from his twenty-year nap in the winter time, he can be remembered off-hand was to tool around the village taverns and ask what had become of the jolly old king, and go through similar futile performances which never got him anything.

Here's a man now, Hyman Levy from the same old Sleepy Hollow that Irving made famous, who slept for nearly half of Rip's stretch, and then got really busy after he awakened, and had himself elected trustee of the village of North Tarrytown.

While Rip simply reminisced, Hyman made a real "go-back." Nine years ago Mr. Levy, who was then one of the best known business men and politicians in North Tarrytown, sustained an injury to his leg. Because of that his mind became affected.

PASSED TO TWILIGHT STATE.

He went to sleep—at least, he passed into what might be called a twilight state—and his mind was so clouded that he could not even recognize his most intimate friends. He had to give up real estate and politics and remain a recluse in his home.

At the time, John D. Rockefeller long a friend of Mr. Levy, wanted to buy a large piece of property from him, but the deal had to be called off because of the beginning of the long sleep.

Last fall quite suddenly, Mr. Levy asked one day where his little sons were. He was told they were off camping in the woods. He went to visit them, and after a short stay in the mountains his mind cleared up, he became fully awake again, and was his normal old self.

In a few months he straightened out his life and took his old place in the affairs of North Tarrytown. "I'm going back into politics, too," he announced a short time ago. "I'll get up a ticket of village trustees and head it, and just watch us win!"

WINS ON WAGES AND WORK.—The election for village trustees was a sweeping victory for Mr. Levy and the ticket he had slated His platform was high wages and plenty of work.

"I've had a good long rest," he said after the result of the election was made public, "and now I'm going to keep busy on the job of giving the village a good business administration."

Mr. Levy is known as the "John D. of Sleepy Hollow," because, next to Mr. Rockefeller, he is the largest individual property of the vicinity.

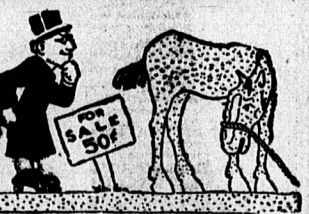

CHICAGOANS SEND FOOD TO GERMANS BY MAIL.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 26.—Six thousand packages of food have been sent by parcel post by Chicagoans to friends and relatives in Germany within the last four days.

Water-proof paper boxes of food, weighing not in excess of ten pounds have been prepared by stores ready for shipment. Each contains an assortment and there are nine assortments. The cost of the packages is from \$1.90 to \$2.15, postpaid.

THIS HEN HAS A WOODEN LEG

SANDUSKY, O., March 26.—A Milan hen, according to information coming from what is considered a reliable source in the town east of here, famed as the birthplace of Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, finds a wooden leg every bit as useful as the genuine article.

The hen is owned by Leonard O'Dell, Lake Shore Electric conductor, who carved the leg out of a piece of hickory with a pocketknife and fastened it with plaster of paris and bicycle tape.

The hen broke her leg trying to scratch gravel while the mercury was 10 degrees below zero.

BREAD OR PEACE POSTERS IN GERMANY.

LONDON, March 26.—A despatch from Copenhagen to Reuters Telegram Company says:

"Red posters inscribed 'Bread or Peace,' are continually appearing in towns in the province of Schleswig-Holstein and in Hamburg and Lubeck, according to a telegram from Woyens, on the German frontier, published in the newspaper of the Danish capital.

"The police remove the placards, but they have not succeeded in arresting any of the persons responsible for them."

GERMAN BOMB NEAR BELGIAN RELIEF SHIP.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Secretary Bryan announced today that the United States would call the attention of Germany to the report from The Hague, that a German aeroplane had dropped a bomb which endangered the Belgian Relief Commission ship Eliland, near the Dutch coast.
