The mail train arrived last night at 10.20. Misses Minnie and Sadie Gillis, Grandview, were in the city yesterday.

Mr. G. McKinnon who has been visiting in Charlottetown, has returned to Montserrat.

Mrs. Daniel McLaren left yesterday for Vancouver, where her husband has been settled for some time.

The Empress having come off the slip at Pictou arrived here at 8.40, bringing the mails and passengers.

Miss Harrison, organist of St. James' Church, is spending a few days at Vernon driver Bridge the guest of Mrs. D. P. Irving.

The Northumberland arrived late last night from Summerside and will resume her regular trips on the route between here and Pictou.

O. T. Murray, of Eureka, N. S., has sold his property to Geo. Gunn, of Hopewell, who will move his family there shortly. Mr. Murray and family move to P. E. I.

The closing exercises of St. Dunstan's College will take place Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock. The address to the graduates will be delivered by Lt-Governor McKinnon.

Miss Alice Rodd has resigned her position with Paton & Co. and intends leaving shortly for the West. During Miss Rodd's stay in Charlottetown she has made many friends who will regret her departure.

The Empress after discharging here last night proceeded to Summerside and will run as usual between that port and Pictou for the rest of the season. The Brant has been honorably retired from this route.

The results of the final examinations at the Union Commercial College were made known on Saturday. The following students graduated from the shorthand and typewriting department: Hilda McKinnon, Goose River, (honors); Angie Trainor, City, (honors); Margaret McKinnon, Hartsville, (honors); Mary A. McKinnon, Brooklyn. From commercial department, Fred W. Gordon, Brudenell, J. P. Quinn, Cardigan.

At the Police Court yesterday, Fred McKinnon and Robt. Ingles, drunk and disorderly, were each fined \$10 or thirty days; Albert Hughes and B-nj. Byers, same charge, were each fined five dollars or twenty days and the cases against M. Heanessey, J. Callaghan and John Hardy, also on similar charges were adjourned until to-morrow. The cases against P. McMullan and John Mullins were dismissed. Two boys for being disorderly were remanded for a week.

The Canadian Magazine for June contains an excellent variety of contributions, the ones of most significance being an article by Prof. R. E. Moenaghten, entitled "A Plea for Woman Suffrage in Canada"; "Reminiscences of Tiller and Mitchell," by J. E. B. McCready; "Canada's New Cavern World," by Frank Yeighand "Plays of the Season," by John E. Webb. The fiction and verse are of high order. A short story entitled "Over the Tiles to Charlie," is exceptionally entertaining, and at the same time deals with a great problem—the distribution of wealth. Altogether the number contains eleven articles and four short stories, besides the usual departments.

It may interest dairy farmers in Prince Edward Island to know that the Dominion Department of Agriculture reports as follows regarding the Cow Testing Association: At Cowanville, Que. the average yield of 119 cows for 30 days ending 27 April is 677 lb. milk and 23.8 lb. fat. The highest individual yield is 1369 lb. milk testing 4.8. The Shearer, Ont. Association has an average yield for the same period of 624 lb. milk and 18.9 lb. fat. The best individual yield here is 880 lb. milk testing 2.7 only. In the Association at Collierton, Ont. the average of 200 cows is 750 lb. milk and 25.7 lb. fat for the period ending 7 May. There are several individual yields here of over 1000 lb. milk, the highest being 1885 lb. testing 3.2. The 100 cows in the Spring Creek Association average 702 lb. milk and 26.4 lb. fat. Several individual cows here go over the 1100 lb. mark, one good yield being 1470 lb. milk testing 3.4 for the 30 days ending 1 May. At Hatley, Que., the average test is the same as at Spring Creek, Ont., namely 3.4 for the same period, but the average yield is only 543 lb. milk and 19.0 lb. fat. The highest production of any one cow is 8.40 lb. milk testing 3.1. St. Armand, Que. from 161 cows averages 488 lb. milk and 18.8 lb. fat. Woodburn, Ont. with 79 cows has an average yield of 671 lb. milk and 22.3 lb. fat. Almost all the duly organized associations are now at work, the members sending in their bottles of composite samples promptly. In another two weeks much fuller and better records than above may be expected.

The death took place at East Boston, Mass., May 17, of Miss Edith Keenan, aged 18 years, and daughter of the late Charles Keenan, late of Charlottetown.

John Fullerton of the Bank of Nova Scotia, has been transferred to Moncton and leaves for there this morning. His father Rev. T. F. Fullerton accompanies him on a short visit.

The balloting for the L. C. R. employees' representatives on the Provident Fund has been announced. The result of the voting is that John Stewart, locomotive engineer, Moncton, and J. W. Nairn, locomotive engineer, Truro, and J. A. Theberge, were elected by a majority of 408 votes over his colleague on the board while Mr. Stewart was over three hundred ahead of the next highest man, who is Mr. Theberge, the well known station agent at Bathurst and a prominent O.R. T. man. Peter McQuaid, Charlottetown, had 280 votes.

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers reports showed the enrollment for the past month to be 1541, actual attendance 1149; average attendance 1028, percentage of attendance 80, number of cases of tardiness 222, truants 7; visits to parents 174; notices to parents 8; corporal punishment 16; below average in grading 98. Mr. Barlow was granted permission to make a display of manual training work at the Dominion Exhibition at Sherbrooke. Miss McIntyre's and Mr. Lee Sweeney's resignations were accepted. A number of applications for the vacancies were received but action was deferred till next meeting of the Board. Notice of the re-appointment of Henry Smith by the Government for the term of four years was recorded. It was decided that pupils about to enter the City schools must make application during either the first weeks in September, January or April. It was agreed that in view of the model School taking about 100 more pupils in the new classes, the re-arrangement of the classes in the City schools will take place at the end of the present term.

It was resolved that the closing exercises of the school be conducted as in former years and a committee was appointed to take charge of the making of the pupils in the Market Hall on Wednesday the 26th inst. The schools will re-open after summer holidays on September 4th. The secretary was instructed to advertise for tenders for coal, kalsomining and repairs.
