

Deputy Minister To Attend Local Dinner

Mr. Alex Skelton, assistant Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, will attend the dinner meeting tendered to the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation of the Charlottetown Board of Trade next Tuesday evening, according to word received yesterday from Mr. Clive Planta, manager of the Fisheries Council of Canada.

Mr. Skelton will replace Hon. R. Mayne, Minister of Fisheries who was originally announced as the guest speaker. The Minister is expected to arrive in Charlottetown on Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. when some forty members of the Fisheries Federation will be present at the Board of Trade. Mr. Skelton is a Rhodes scholar. Mr. Skelton has a varied background as a producer of political science and economics at the University of Saskatchewan, an economist with the Rockefeller Bureau of International Research in Ottawa during the past year, and as a member of the staff of the Bank of Canada.

In 1947 he was appointed director-general of economic research with the Department of Reconstruction and Supply. As secretary to a number of Dominion-Provincial committees, he is familiar with the general problems in Dominion-Provincial relations.

As a Queen's undergraduate, Mr. Skelton was outstanding as a student and football player. His interests include tennis, golf, and the sprit still stands and he held the middle-weight boxing championship of the Navy, Army and Air Force while with the R.A.F.

Prof. MacNutt Guest Speaker

Professor Stuart MacNutt, of the Department of History at the University of New Brunswick, son of Major T. Edgar MacNutt, Charlottetown, was guest speaker at the convention of the Maritime Water Works Association held recently at Amherst.

The following account of Professor MacNutt's address appeared in the Amherst Daily News: "Professor MacNutt gave a highly interesting address in which he stressed the early development of the water systems of Rome and the ancient cities. He also discussed the trends of modern education and stated that engineers and technicians should have a widely developed background, in addition to their technical knowledge. He declared that such knowledge was essential in their present work as it would round out their education."

Mr. MacNutt was no stranger to Amherst. Citizens as he was stationed in that City for a period during the war before he proceeded overseas with the North Nova Scotia Highlanders.

Continuation Of 9 A. M. Sunday Ferry Service Confirmed

The following copy of a letter from the General Superintendent of Transportation, C.N.R., to Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Director of Transportation in the Provincial Department of Industry and Natural Resources, has been received by Mr. Montgomery, Superintendent of the Island Division, C.N.R.:

"Dear Mr. Rogers: "Referring to yours of the 27th instant and our subsequent telephone conversation.

"This is to confirm that we have agreed to the continuation of the service to the end of the year, but due to the fact that the potato shipments are now becoming heavy and to adhere to the 1:00 p.m. departure from Borden and the 3:00 p.m. departure from Tormentine would mean considerable delay to the boat at each terminal and would eventually mean that we would lose the opportunity to make an extra round trip within the twenty-four hours, and due to the fact that we would only be accommodating a very few automobiles at any one time for any of these trips, we do not wish to retard these operations to this extent. For instance, the boat returning from Tormentine at 10:35 a.m. would in all probability leave Borden about 12:00 noon, or shortly thereafter which would mean up to an hour's holding to maintain the one o'clock departure. Then the same thing would take place on the three o'clock departure from Tormentine. I gleaned from our conversation that if we maintained the earlier trip at 9:10 a.m., your principals would be satisfied."

"I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Montgomery and arrangements will be made during the week for the continuation on this basis as of next Sunday, November 6th."

Conference In Paris Planned

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 — (AP) — Dean Acheson, United States Secretary of State, will fly to Paris early next week for a swift conference on German and European foreign policy with Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin of Britain and Foreign Minister Robert Schuman of France.

The Western Big Three will also discuss organization of the North American-Western European defenses under the Atlantic treaty, the State Department announced.

Acheson probably will leave here Monday night. He will spend two days with Bevin and Schuman.

The probable departure date means that he will take off shortly after meeting with Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky of Russia, who is coming to Washington Monday from New York for a Soviet Embassy celebration of the anniversary of the Russian revolution.

If it turns out that Vishinsky and Acheson upset predictions of their own aides and engage in more than diplomatic small talk, the timetable affords opportunity for the Western foreign-policy chiefs in Paris to come to grips quickly with any new East-West problems raised.

Drive To End U. S. Coal Strike

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 — (AP) — Federal mediator Cyrus S. Ching held a two-hour parley with John L. Lewis today and then called southern mining owners to meet in Washington Monday in a drive to end the 47-day coal strike.

Coal operators from other sections of the country will be called later, Ching said.

In the steel strike, prospects for an early settlement remained uncertain.

MONCTON, Nov. 5 — Indications are that the Maritimes are going to enjoy a good smelt fishing season this year, R. A. Gordon, Supgt. of the Atlantic Division, Canadian National Express, told newsmen here today.

Since the season began on October 15, there has been a steady movement from all sections of the region, said Mr. Gordon.

Today later, 4,000 pounds were hauled from Shediac, N.B., Bridgewater, N.S., and from Charlottetown, P. E.I., for New York.
