COMING SPEEDER.—Mr. Marc J. Arsenault, Abram's Village, has purchased a fine 3 year old from Hubert Arsenault, St. Chrysostom, for which he paid a reasonable sum.—M.

BRIDGE REPAIRS.—The work of putting on the braces on the Hamilton bridge is now completed. Considerable delay was experienced in this work, the season being so late, and the high tide caused the men to give up work very often.—M.

PRODUCE.—Produce still continues to pour into Victoria. On Tuesday Wright Bros., took in 1700 bushels of potatoes, 700 bushels of oats and 500 bushels of turnips. The prices paid were 22c. a bushel for potatoes, 46c. a bushel for white oats, 47c. a bushel for black oats, and 14c. a bushel for turnips.—V.

RELIEF FUND.—The Belgian Relief Committee of Summerside will send the second consignment of goods to the Central Committee, Charlottetown on Monday, Nov. 16th. All who wish to make further contribution either in money or clothing and bedding will kindly do so before that date. Contributions may be sent to the Armoury or to Miss Carrie Holman, Summerside. All money received will be spent in Summerside on provisions.—H.

WHARF NEWS.—A large amount of shipping is at present going on at the Souris wharves. A number of vessels are loading up produce; others are discharging cargoes of coal. A large number of fishing vessels sought shelter in Souris during the storm of Saturday and Sunday. Three coasters also arrived on Sunday afternoon. The Arizona is at the railway wharf, where she is loading produce. The fishing vessel, Frank D., owned by J. M. Cheverie, Souris, is in port at the railway wharf. The schooner Winnifred arrived in port from Charlottetown on Saturday in charge of Captain P. J. Ernst, with a half cargo of potatoes. J. J. Hughes & Co. will finish loading her. As soon as her cargo of 7,000 bushels of oats and potatoes is completed, she will sail for Halifax. The schooner Patriot, Captain Sanson, arrived on Monday and is being loaded by J. J. Hughes & Co. for Glace Bay. Her cargo will consist of potatoes only. Captain J. Hiseock brought his schooner, the Violet Courtney, into port on Sunday at its loading general cargo at the railway wharf for St. Pierre and Miquelon. Thomas Kiekham & Co., Souris West, is furnishing the cargo. The schooner Florida, Captain W. H. Bennett, is being loaded with a general cargo for Halifax. She arrived in port on Friday with a cargo of Inverness coal for Thomas Kiekham & Co., Souris West, which she discharged at Matthew and McLean's wharf. The fishing vessel, Annie M., owned by Poole Bros. Souris, is at Matthew & McLean's wharf. The coaster Dictator is expected in port with a cargo of stone for the "rip-rap" work. The Lady Sybil docked at the railway wharf at 5.30 Wednesday evening. Her cargo was light and passenger list small. After taking on board 150 head of sheep and a quantity of oats, she left for Pictou at 11 p. m. The Ella J. King, Captain Goodrick, is loading produce at Matthew & McLean's wharf. As soon as her cargo is complete she will sail for Shelburne, N. S.—S.

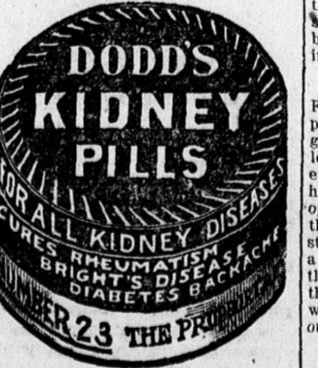
