United Church P.E.I. Presbytery

The P. E. I. Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in Hearst Hall, Charlottetown, May 22nd, at 10:30 a. m. The opening devotional period was conducted by the Chairman assisted by Rev. Geo. Gough and Mr. A. S. McKay. Contributions were offered by the Presbytery to Rev. Dr. Hugh Miller for the honor conferred on him.

Rev. L. Murray was appointed Assistant Secretary, and Rev. J. A. Nicholson, reporter. Rev. A. S. Weir was appointed as member of the Settlement Committee. Letters were received regarding the transfer of Rev. Geo. Christie to St. Peter's, C. B. and Rev. E. Miller to Florenceville, N. B. The resignation of Rev. E. R. Woodside from Cornwall charge was received and accepted. Several calls were then dealt with. Calls from Breadalbane to Rev. J. Morrison; Bedeque to Rev. J. M. Baxter; Hampton to Rev. Roy Peterson; St. Peter's to Rev. W. A. Vesper.

Applications were received from Revs. E. R. Woodside, T. J. Humphrey and W. J. MacLeod asking for leave of absence to engage in other work. These were referred by the Pastoral Relations Committee.

The Secretary read the correspondence. Many letters were referred to the different committees concerned. Amongst the correspondence were communications from Rev. J. A. Fraser, Rev. G. A. Sisco, Principal, and Rev. E. R. Woodside, Rev. C. A. Myers.

The correspondence was received. Several applications were read from ministers of other churches. Rev. Geo. Ayers, Treasurer, then reported on the finances of the Presbytery. He reported a balance on hand.

Rev. J. Matheson, chairman of the Archives Committee, gave a very interesting report on the importance of the keeping of records. He outlined the history of the Presbyterian and Methodist United Church of Canada, and the resolution asking that the records of the Presbytery be sent to Sackville, N. B. and placed in the fireproof room there. This was adopted.

Rev. W. I. Green of Dundas then reported for the Missionary Education Committee. The following resolution was adopted by Presbytery: "In view of the great responsibility of Christian service in the reconstruction period after the war, the Presbytery pledges itself to a greater support of the Christian missionary work."

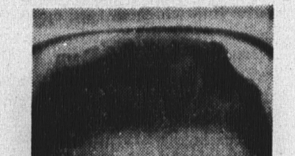
This was unanimously adopted. Rev. L. Murray spoke on the subject of Church papers: The United Churchman and The Observer. Presbytery adjourned to meet in the afternoon.

Rev. D. K. Ross opened the afternoon session by leading in prayer. The different committees were asked to report. The committee on Education and students reported the following students from P. E. I. studying for the ministry: Howard Christie, Earl Leard, Melbourne MacDowell.

Rev. R. H. Barker delivered a comprehensive report of the Evangelical and social service committee.

(Continued from page 1) "Anyone found on the streets during those hours and who does not stop when called upon to do so will be shot immediately."

A later announcement said: "Whoever hopes to hide the guilty persons or who gives them any kind of help or security, or secretly withholds any knowledge of a crime will be executed."

Some broadcasts said the entire family of any such persons also would be put to death.

Grave Feats A Czech government source here expressed grave fears that "the shooting of Heydrich will result in mass executions of innocent people on a scale unprecedented—even in this war."

Church circles here expressed the belief that the shooting either was in protest against Heydrich's order conscripting Czech youths for war service on the Russian front or against his announcement last night that there would be a reorganization of the administrative set-up in Bohemia and Moravia.

This was interpreted as an indication that Hitler had decided to incorporate the protectorate within the Reich proper.

War — 25 Years Ago Today

Nursing Recruits Needed, Says Red Cross Supervisor

Miss Nora MacKenzie, Supervisor for Nursing Services of the National Red Cross Office, Toronto, is at present visiting the province in the interests of the nursing auxiliary section of the Canadian Red Cross Corps. She will be here until Friday and is registered at The Charlottetown.

In an interview last night, Miss MacKenzie explained that the purpose of the Corps is to prepare young women as nursing aides or V.A.D.'s for hospital service in the event of an emergency. This service is for either civilian hospitals, the hospitals under the Department of Health, emergency hospitals, or army hospitals when the demand arises. Also the work may be at home or abroad. Some will be mobile and some immobile.

The course includes home nursing, first aid, military drill, physical training, King's rules and orders, etc. At the end of the period of training the V.A.D.'s are asked to take a period of either two or six weeks training in a hospital to complete their course. It is also expected that these young women will give some service to hospitals when it is required of them.

The Corps is very anxious to get recruits for this service because the emergency already exists as there is a shortage of nurses here, Miss MacKenzie stated.

She went on to say that an emergency Nursing Reserve would be established here during her visit. This section deals with the teaching of home nursing which has always been a peacetime activity of the Red Cross. However, for the duration the Red Cross is making an attempt to bring the opportunity to learn elementary nursing procedures to every woman who desires this training.

This course comprises home nursing and emergency training for war work. At the end of this course officials held their first conference today on aids raid precaution cooperation in adjoining border areas.
