—EBBSFLEET NOTES.—Mr. J. F. Reid speaks in glowing praise of Capt. John R. Perry, now in command of the schooner Wild Brier on which vessel he took passage to Chatham, N. B., laden with produce. They left Mimomegash on the 12th, 8 p. m., after the second attempt to get out on account of heavy sea and low tide, arriving in Chatham on the 18th after a tempestuous and hazardous voyage.
